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The Debate: Does God Exist?

On a hot August 13th night, Atheists & Other Freethinkers hosted a lively debate with the topic of "Does god exist?" Even with the temperature peaking over 110 degrees, an overflow crowd of 250 listened to arguments presented by atheist and former fundamentalist preacher Dan Barker from the Freedom From Religion Foundation, and by former Mormon member Sacramento theist John Morehead from the American Religion Information Center.

Moderator Hank Kocol and timekeeper Ed McConnell ably kept the debate on schedule. Freethinkers from San Jose, San Francisco, Palo Alto, Stockton, Redding, and other cities joined AOF members and many believers in this AOF milestone activity.

Morehead began the debate by stating that atheists were required to prove that god does not exist. He introduced the theists' claim that the universe was designed, whereas atheists claim that the "Big Bang" created the universe from nothing. Barker followed by noting that Morehead was in error in claiming atheists must prove that god does not exist since one cannot prove a negative; therefore, proving the existence of god was in the theists' court. He stressed the laws of nature and pointed out that, if indeed

god existed, he was impotent as he could not or would not prevent diseases and other disasters. Barker also stated that if god exi sted, Isaac Asimovwould have written a book about it by now. Morehead rebutted with several theological arguments for the existence of god noting that god tolerates evils. Barker later stated that if god is infinite, then god doesn't exist because god would also have to have a beginning. Thus, "Where did god come from" asked Barker. When Barker stated the existence of god remains a mystery, Morehead nodded in agreement. Barker pointed out that people in the past worshiped Zeus, Jupiter and other gods but he, Barker, just believes in one less god than Christians do.

Written questions were submitted by audience members and moderator Hank Kocol rotated the questions between believers and freethinkers. In this exchange, Barker stressed that everything had to be caused, whereas Morehead claimed that everything was caused except god, and everything was designed except god. To this, Barker poin ted out the circular reasoning of Morehead's claims. Morehead claimed god was non-physical, a spirit, but was unable to define a spirit to Barker's satisfaction.

Barker brought up the Second Law of Thermodynamics which states that entropy increases over time and that creationists erroneously use this concept in refuting evolution. Morehead did not know how many Laws of Thermodynamics there were nor did he know the First Law of Thermodynamics which states energy cannot be created or destroyed, only transformed.

The debaters also questioned each other during a freeform session. On the matter of evil and violence in the Old Testament, Barker stated that god had to cleanse his people by killing those who did not obey him. Then Morehead raised the question as to what moral standard atheists use to criticize Old Testament violence. Barker cited Isaiah, noting that god created evil and god condoned and ordered killings in the Old Testament.

On the matter of morality, Barker noted that man uses his brain to avoid harming others and to avoid others harming him and does so without absolute moral standards. Barker noted the "Bronze" rule of Jesus "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you" and the "golden" rule of Confucius "Don't do that unto others what you would not have them do to you." He cited Confucius' rule as superior to that of Jesus. Morehead's position was one of absolute moral standards, and he also cited that animal rights activists refer to "harm" and "pain" when talking about moral standards. Barker refuted Morehead's statement that atheists claim somet hing was created from nothing. He also referred to scientific studies where prayer had no beneficial effect in healing the sick.

The debaters agreed on the issues of church and state separation and the ineffectiveness of faith healers. The debaters were cordial in their pre sentations and the audience was orderly. The debaters informally agreed to the possibility of a future debate on the Resurrection. Barker stated "we'd probably get a rise out of it" and Morehead stated that Barker's arguments on the subject "would be all dead." Laughter ensued.

Proceeds from the debate allowed AOF to make a sizable contribution to the Freedom From Religion Foundation.

Evolution vs. Creationism: An Explanation of Life

AOF's August 11th speakers, Paul Storey and Dave Flanders, gave a presentation addressing the theory of evolution. Evidence supporting evolution came from the sciences of geology, anatomy, physiology, embryology, genetics and immunology.

Pictures from geology illustrated the vast expanse of time which has preceded us. Illustrations from leading publishers depicted forms of life throughout earth's history from cell to multi-cellular sphere, to worms, to fishes, to amphibians, to reptiles, to primates to man.

Attention was given to the final stages of evolution from the apes to men, because many people choose to deny this is possible, even though genetic and immunological measurements show less than 5% of humans are different from the genes of the great apes. The variation in genes in one generation is visible in the differences between siblings. Multiply these differences by a million generations, at 20 years per generation, and it shows how much genetic change and diversity in a species can occur in 20 million years.

Gradual change through eons of time were compared to the concept of catas trophism. Dave Flanders addressed the philosophical implications of evolution with charts that he constructed, and the following evolution timeline was presented.

Milestones in the Development of Thought On the Origin of Life: 30,000 B.C.

cave drawings, nomadic tribes worship gods of the hunt, gods of war, goddesses of fertility, etc.

2,000 B.C.

the Egyptian employed gods that are half human, half animal.

1,000 B.C.

Greek and Roman mythology depicted immortal gods in human form, who played chess with the lives of men.

50 A.D.

Christianity unified all gods into one, all powerful, all present god of abstract form.

0 A.D.

People believed that the earth was flat and the center of the universe and life came from encapsulation like one Chinese box inside the other: inside the sperm of the first man was his seed, inside the seed was a tiny little man, his son, inside the tiny man was a tiny tiny man, etc.

1492

Visalius discovered circulation of the blood. Previously it was believed blood originated in the liver, was boiled in the heart, and went out the through the blood vessels into the ether. The religiously dominated society refused to accept this explanation for a hundred years.

1600

Galileo showed Earth was not the center of the solar system. Galileo was persecuted by the Church for heresy. His works were burned. The heliocentric solar system defied the biblical story that Moses stopped the sun in the sky which really meant Moses stopped the earth from rotating 1,000 miles per hour (a very sudden deceleration). Galileo's ideas did not become widely accepted for a hundred years.

1723

Leeuvenhoek first observed microorganisms.

1778

Linnaeus classified all living things into logical groupings.

1840

Malthus described the math of living organisms reproducing exponentially, until reaching the limits of the food supply.

1857

Charles Darwin published Origin of Species describing gradual change over long periods of time (natural selection as a filter which separates the good from the bad). Survival of the fittest is the mechanism of evolution. His ideas are still gaining acceptance 140 years later.

1861

Pasteur disproved spontaneous generation of life.

1876

Robert Koch proposed the germ theory of disease. Before this, it was believed that disease was divine punishment for sins. The new idea was quickly accepted when the Queen of England allowed herself to be vaccinated against smallpox, even if it meant her thwarting God's will.

1900

Mendel's law of genetics were recognized.

1962

Crick and Watson discovered the chemical structure of DNA.

On August 1st Atheists & Other Freethinkers ventured into the radio inter view market on the Bob Dunning show. The program was heard on AM station KFBK in Sac ramento. When Sid Fong, the show's producer, call Betty Simonsma to ask if she would do the interview she did not turn him down. She felt she must begin to speak out for atheism if she was serious about her position.

As those who listened to his whole three hour show know, Dunning interviewed her for approximately 20 minutes (including ads) and took only four calls relating to atheism. Then he definitely and soundly switched to the subject of the Giant's baseball player who turned his AIDS ribbon into a fish to proclaim his opposition to homosexuality.

Dunning got in his first negative by complaining that her name, Simonsma, did not have enough vowels which, incidentally, has one more than his name. He t hen wanted to discuss the meaning of 'freethinker' claiming he was one, a Catholic who came to his belief through free thought, even though he had gone to parochial schools. (Stop laughing.) AOF president, Karen Abbe, squeezed in a call by saying she had a couple of questions for Dunning. She managed to tell of the upcoming debate with Dan Barker.

Dunning's other three calls pertaining to atheism were from fundamentalists who discussed the word 'freethinker' by also trying to assure the public they owned the word. Every caller for the rest of the three hours was seeped in religious righteousness and fervor and praise for Dewey and his fish.

Betty was able to speak of AOF's concern over the separation of government and religion and that if any other religious groups were trying to put their prayers into the schools by changing the U.S. Constitution the public would be up in arms. The name Atheists and Other Freethinkers was mentioned often. That was the big plus.

Betty commented afterwards that she emerged from the experience convinced that atheists must speak out and not let others have all of the platforms, podiums, pulpits, airwaves and simple conversations. She said we all need practice learning how to handle the subject atheism. As Judith Hayes wrote in her letter to the Stockton Record, "...believers will simply not tolerate the absence of belief. They will tolerate wildly contradictory faiths but not unbelief."

The public needs to listen to atheists and learn what we are all about and atheists need to speak out proudly.
