Reflections Upon Returning From Bolivia

When I finally gave up on my Mom's misguided religion as a young man and became an atheist, I distinctly remember wondering at the time what other learned beliefs I would ultimately learn to discard. In short order, the carnivorous habit and the belief that persistent violence and killing by my own government in overseas lands would lead to an enduring peace soon evaporated as obsolete values.

During my recent trip to Bolivia, this reflection occurred to me as I viewed the indigenous people's struggle to adjust to a new system where

they have relatively equal opportunities today compared to the more than five centuries of oppression their ancestors had experienced since the Spaniards had arrived. Do they follow the old European path to success and prosperity now available to them or do they embrace their proud native tribal traditions

which may be somewhat more humble? Monotheism or polytheism? Monogamy or polygamy? The clash between the different orientations is breathtaking and appears in some instances to be irreconcilable.

Here in the U.S., we have no such contradictions having chosen the European model long ago. But we are all still socialized and pro-

> grammed to believe a certain way by our families and more importantly by our endemic culture. And this process of indoctrination will determine our pre-

dispositions in life unless trauma or an epiphany makes us reevaluate those individual pre-dispositions.

Our ability to free ourselves from those influences and allow logic and reason to be our guide will determine our level of personal liberty.



Historical Figures Series

Presbyter John the Emperor-Priest By Ken Nahigian

Religions excite passion: passionate commitments, passionate divisions, passionate hopes. Exceptions occur, of course, but Christianity was never one. While Jews fumed at the idea that God would sire a son, Christians bickered over his nature—a son wholly divine, wholly human, or a mix? The "orthodox" answer, derived in CE 451, was that he was both, yet not a mix-both 100% human and 100% divine. We moderns have largely forgotten these heated early disputes, the rages and schisms, hopes kindled and crushed, blood spilled, and curious resolutions. But they show Christendom was never monolithic. From its first heartbeat it was in turmoil, broken by faction, riven by conflict, wrapped in paradox, and balancing worlds on a grain of sand.

No surprise, the environment it made was a fertile soil for rumors, myths and mysteries. Prester John was just one such, by no means the strangest.

In the 1160s, while Pope Alexander III held his curia in France, a mysterious letter began to circulate. No one knows the true author. Passed hand to hand, it told of a magical Eastern empire, a milk-and-honey Christian utopia in the "three Indias," besieged by infidels. The supposed writer was its ruler, Prester (Presbyter) John, of the family of the Three Magi.

Eager scribes copied the letter and passed it on. Today we have over 100 versions, most of them addressed to the Byzantine Emperor of Rome, others to the Pope or the French King. Alexander took it on himself to answer. He sent his personal physician, Master Philippus, out twice to find the Prester. So far as we know, Philippus never returned from the second outing.

Other expeditions followed, hoping to reach and rescue the Prester's kingdom, and maybe skim a small profit from his magic seeing-mirror, the rivers of gold or the Fountain of Youth (the letter was the first recorded mention of such a fountain). One problem: no one knew where the Three Indias were—like Cathay (China) and Ultima Thule, India was more of a metaphor then for "someplace far." One envoy after another came limping home, or van-

ished off the edge of the map. Meanwhile, editions of the letter grew more fabulous and more intriguing.

Why did the Prester so fascinate European Christians? He showed the universality of the Church, proved that Christian Faith transcended culture and geography, encompassed all humanity, at a time when ethnic and religious strife were casting doubts on the idea. It was much as if we received a message from extraterrestrials to find that they are much like us, and share our taste in ice cream.

So they sought. In the 13th century Marco Polo identified the Prester with the chief of a Mongolian tribe which was then Nestorian Christian.

Others looked to China. After 1340, most had decided the Prester's kingdom was not in Asia, so a story revision put his realm in Ethiopia (vaguely, deep Africa). Portugal sent expeditions to find Prester John through the fifteenth century. Eventually it imagined it did, and much annoyed the Abyssinian ambassadors by calling their monarch by that name, which was not on their official list of regnal names or titles.

The myth continued to live and unfold, ghosting through the mythic maze of Christendom. Up to about 1700, cartographers still used the magic empire to fill blank spaces on their maps. The story would vanish or sleep, then revive at odd moments, generally times of crisis.

For example, when Crusaders fought t h e Saracen "paynims" (heathens), and were losing badly, in 1219: Suddenly a miracle appeared from the East—the pavnim armies were in rout, their forces smashed and drained. Surely it was the great Emperor, marching at last from the "Indies" or "beyond Persia and Armenia" to help restore Israel to the cross! Ecstatic street prophets raved of the Prester, coming to mark the beginning of the end of time.

Then the miracle reached the gates of Vienna. It was not the Prester, but the Mongol horde, led by the great Genghis Kahn. Flush with victory against the Moslem, seeking new worlds to conquer, he paused to whet his sword. Soon the Church had a new wolf at its throat-one that made it think wistfully of the Saracen. And again, dreams of Prester John and his wondrous empire melted in the cruel light, fading back into smoke, into the myth and shadows and mystery which had engendered it, to slumber, and return another day.

to pleas of reason and demands for justice?



Is he the one who played a joke on Job, that hapless and bewildered servant who in his guileless and naïve devotion could not find reason for descent of plagues upon his head in spite of curious counsel?

We're told that God rewarded in the end this steadfast victim of a pointless test.

That enigmatic exercise revealed that fickle God plays games beyond a reason to be explained by wisest of his creatures.

Tormented and exasperated soul of Job was crushed and driven to repentance, although not one of his three old advisors, not Eliphaz, not Bildad, and not Zophar,



That God demean himself to meet a challenge by a Fallen Angel is beyond contempt.

That he should deign to sacrifice his creature to satisfy the slander of a traitor, a loser in celestial coup d'état, does not bespeak secure omnipotence.

A question that was raised is whether man

may judge the actions of a God who made him.

From me you'll hear a loud, resounding "Yes!"

If I in fatalistic acquiescence resign my life without demanding justice

from God by saying that his perfect will

is too incomprehensible for me, and stand in silent stupor in his shadow.

what moral sense should summon me to bow?

Is God unable to communicate his purpose clearly to my feeble mind? If so, I cannot then believe he's perfect. If so, the burden must be laid on him.

I cannot claim he's just when I see justice,

then when I see injustice, simply say, "It is God's will, it's not right for me to question."

My human sense of right cannot employ elastic rule to gauge such mystic God.

So he rewarded Job for bearing boils and standing loss of family and cattle with generous replenishment of wealth—more children and superfluous sheep and camels. New daughters even rated proper names: Jemima, Kez and Keren were all beauties. But former three, as well as seven brothers, remain forgotten, nameless in the rubble, along with servants smitten by Chaldeans.

The bountiful new blessings were perhaps enough to make Job think his tribulations were worth enduring, that's if he forgot his slaughtered children, animals and servants.

But being a bit more sensitive than God, I look beyond myopic moral focus of this heroic painted tale of faith,

who resolutely follow his commands?

Why should I thank him for unlocking chains which he had wrapped around my wrists and ankles?

If you should be assaulted (God forbid) by someone clubbing blows to smash your bones, should he get tired or have had his fill, would you then thank him if he stop the beating?


