The Children's Crusade By Ken Nahigian

A mote of truth began it. Then like a snowflake or pearl, the story took layers, condensed, and crystallized, to became part of the mythology of the Crusades, and its most poignant tragedy.

In the common tale, Jesus himself appeared to a young boy, calling on him to lead an army of innocents to the Holy Land to convert the Muslims. Abetted by miracles and portents, the child gathered 20,000 waifs and orphans. He led them as far as the Mediterranean Sea. Here two merchants offered passage. The unscrupulous merchants then sold the children into slavery (or they were shipwrecked and drowned). The Children's Crusade failed, and the angels wept.

The story has likely roots in two events, which history has muddled and mixed. In 1212 a rabble marched from Germany into Italy, as far as the port of Genoa. The group became dispirited or confused when the sea failed to part as promised. Scattering, they vanished from history.

At about that time, in France, a charismatic shepherd appeared, claiming to bear a letter from Jesus to the French king. He lead a mass of poor people to Paris, reportedly working miracles. Finally King Phillip II took notice, and told the crowd to give it up and go home. They did.

As crusades go, both were fairly anticlimactic. No one went to Jerusalem. Why children, why a crusade? One theory suggests a mistranslation—chroniclers writing a generation later mistook the Latin word pueri, slang for "country boys," as literal children. The pueri were wandering displaced peasants, somewhat inclined to religious fads and hysteria. But the mental image of children marching to the Holy Land was just too good to be untrue, and people love a story.

More to the point perhaps, the time was just after the Fourth Crusade, a

period of bitterness and anomie for Christendom, as it marveled and grieved over its failure to hold the Holy Land. The romantic story of a Children's Crusade gave an answer. We are sinners; we don't deserve it.

In fact and in the broad view, the Crusades were a romantic disaster. Pope Urbane II launched the First (1096-1099). It held Jerusalem for 88 years, but at cost of staggering bloodshed: the invaders killed nearly everyone in the city, Jews, Muslims and Christians. "The slaughter was so great that our men waded in blood up to their ankles," wrote one witness. Another: "Indeed, if you had been there you would have seen our feet coloured to our ankles with the blood of the slain. ... None of them were left alive; neither women nor children were spared." The siege of Antioch on the way was hardly less bloody. By contrast, after the Sultan Saladin took back Jerusalem in 1187, he let most everyone go. And the Muslim world remembered.

The Second Crusade (1147) tried to expand the conquest, but fizzled. The Third (1187–1192) failed to recapture the Holy City. The Fourth (1202–1204) was another try, but short funds plus some intrigue motivated the crusaders to attack Constantinople instead. Sacking it, they finalize the Great Schism between Catholic and Orthodox Christendom. Pope Innocent III was mortified. Eight hundred years later, Pope John Paul II was still apologizing.

And between the big numbered ones were mini-Crusades, like the Paupere's Crusade (1096) or the Crusade of 1101, and at least five big campaigns after the Fourth. The full history is complex, even Byzantine. Never mind; none of it had a lasting effect on political geography. The mood of an era, its spirit, its cultural and collective climate, is rarely in the details—but in fads and myths, in mania and fashion, in rumors and sentiment. These are the true movers of history.

The Children's Crusade, just a story, distilled the ebullience and despair of a medieval Christian world, which equated the New Jerusalem (God's Kingdom) to the old. Wouldn't a successful conquest set the stage for Christ's Return? For now men may lack the humility and purity to achieve this. But here was a new idea: that people can have an active role in bringing the Last Days. Just try enough, sacrifice enough, spill enough blood, and perhaps, perhaps ...

Urbane II simply wanted to fence in the growing Muslim empire, help the Eastern Christians, and heal the rift in the Church. He did not expect Crusade fever to get out of hand, inflame Europe, and begin a holy war that would span centuries.

But so it happened. Today, we are still fighting.


