AOF is honored to present our November speaker: Carole Harper, founder of El Porvenir. For 20 years this organization that has made a true difference for remote, impoverished Nicaraguan villages, supporting community-initiated water, sanitation and reforestation projects. Carole recently returned to the United States after a years-long residency in Nicaragua; she now lives in Davis. Her talk will focus at the long-term positive and negative consequences of the 1979 Nicaraguan revolution within the context of Crane Brinton's "Anatomy of Revolution." Brinton's book models revolutions on social cycles where a post-revolutionary nation moves away



from the Old Order to the installation of a moderate regime, then to a radical one. In this context, Carole will profile four revolutions, including the French and American. From


It is difficult to select "the" highlight of the day. There were many. Our featured speaker, Herb Silverman,



### America's Free Speech Martyr By Ken Nahigian

America's Free Speech Martyr

We honestly believe Christianity to be false, to be the greatest sham in the world, without truth in its history, without loveliness in its doctrines, without benefit to the human race.

- D.M. Bennett


In America the Golden Age of Freethought had one face before the others. It was DeRobigne Mortimer Bennett. For the name alone, he deserved points.

Born December 23, 1818, in Springfield, New York, he was 15 when he joined the United Society of Believers in Christ's Second Appearing—the Shakers, so called for their trembling, ecstatic dances. For 13 years he served the sect as herbalist, physician and scribe. Part of his duty was to record "divine and inspired" messages received in the so-called Era of Manifestations.

The Shakers were, in fact, just one facet of the Second Great Awakening, a revival sweeping the English world then (the First was in the 1730s-1740s), which had caught up the callow Bennett. Near midcentury, as the revival lost steam, the Shakers began to lose younger members, likely due to their rule of strict celibacy. Bennett was one. He eloped with a Shaker schoolteacher, Mary Wicks, in 1846. Friends were shocked, but perhaps not too shocked.

Ex-revivalists tend to settle into a kind of easy-going, ambient faith, wide but not too deep. Not Bennett; he had a restless mind and followed it doggedly. He soon found the writings of Voltaire, Thomas Paine and other "infidels." For the next 27 years, as the couple moved from town to town in pursuit of their pharmaceutical business, Bennett read and studied, crystallized doubts, and grew into an ardent skeptic. In 1873, while in Paris, Illinois, he argued with local ministers about the practical efficacy of prayer. When local newspapers refused to print some of his "infidel" letters, Bennett responded characteristically. He began his own journal. It was The Truth Seeker.

Later that year Bennett moved to New York City. From there he parlayed his magazine into America's best-known, most controversial voice of reform. At the peak, readership approached 50,000, and included Mark Twain, Clarence Darrow and Col. Robert G. Ingersoll. "We embrace," declared Bennett, "... Liberals, Free Religionists, Rationalists, Spiritual-

ists, Unitarians, Friends, Infidels, Freethinkers and in short all who care to think and judge for themselves." The National Liberal League (founded in 1876) adopted *The Truth Seeker* as its official weekly journal.

No surprise. Bennett soon drew the ire of Anthony Comstock, the moral crusader, who was also in New York. Comstock vilified Bennett; Bennett ridiculed Comstock and his supporters. In 1877, Bennett went too far. An angry Comstock, acting in his capacity as a "special Post Office agent," arrested Bennett for mailing an "obscene" pamphlet on marsupial reproduction and a tract entitled "An Open Letter to Jesus Christ." Robert Ingersoll interceded; charges were dropped. But the next year Comstock had Bennett arrested again for selling a fairly pedestrian free love essay titled Cupid's Yokes. (Note, "free love" did not mean casual sex, simply the idea of marriage based on personal commitment rather

than legal constraint. In the day, it was a shocking idea.)

A four-day obscenity trial followed. Hyped by the *New York Sun* as "one of the most important of the day," it was in fact a sham. The judge took a standard of evidence that let the prosecution pull isolated passages out of context. Convicting the elderly Bennett, the court fined him \$300 and sentenced him to 13 months hard labor at the Albany Penitentiary. According to a *Washington Capitol* reporter, the ruling "surpassed anything of the sort since Pontius Pilate, and would make it dangerous to mail a bible or a copy of Shakespeare to anyone."

Among freethinkers and liberals it was a *cause célèbre*. Bennett drew strong defenders, including Frederick Douglass, Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Ingersoll. Even the Shakers called him "an illustrious martyr, suffering from acts of the most devilish bigotry of our day." (Despite his apostasy, Bennett had kept an affection for the Shakers, and they for him.) President Hayes received a petition for pardon with over 200,000 signatures. Alas, Comstock's supporters were stronger, louder, and politically better heeled. Hayes demurred. Bennett went to prison.

Next year, a sick and broken Bennett emerged to find a hero's welcome. His last adventure was a world tour and a set of articles called *An Infidel Abroad and A Truth Seeker Around The World*. But he never recovered. Soon after coming home, on December 6, 1882, he died. Friends raised a monument with the motto, "When The Innocent Is Convicted, The Court Is Condemned."

The Truth Seeker carried on. Despite a strange history and some very curious ups and downs, not all of them pretty, it survives today at <a href="http://www.truthseeker.com/">http://www.truthseeker.com/</a>, the "oldest freethought publication in America." Bennett might not recognize it. The last print edition was in 2004. But deep in the page or behind the sparkling pixels you will hear his voice, irreverent, bellicose and wild, doubting and debating, demanding independence, not just for nations or for states, but for women and men, for each mind and each heart.



While inducting Luther Burbank into our Freethought Gallery, Brian Jones revealed some surprising facts about Burbank – not the least of which is that in response to the Scopes Trial, in 1926 he made a public declaration that he is "an infidel" and that, in California, Arbor Day is celebrated on Luther Burbank's birthday. The music kept the day lively and the comedian and Cleo Kocol had many of us in stitches. And, Mike Newdow led the committee in one of his original songs (I like to call it an anthem), Liberty and Justice for All.

And, we had a setback. For the past five years, we have requested and received from the mayor of Sacramento, Heather Fargo, a Freethought Day Proclamation. The current mayor, Kevin Johnson, however, was not so accommodating and our request was denied. In an effort to make lemonade out of lemons, I issued a press release and Sacramento News and Review reporter, Cosmo Garvin, did a nice job of reporting the story. 
