
Coming In July: Scientology

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Richard Kowaleski Speaks On How To Win Friends and Influence People

May AOF Speaker Recap By David Flanders

Richard Kowaleski was May's AOF speaker. He mentioned techniques that he felt AOF could use to win friends and influence people.¹

Richard Kowaleski said successful movements have three things: (1) a charismatic leader; (2) a written manifesto; and (3) an outward focus. He proceeded to provide examples of success. He mentioned his delight in an organization that promotes the unification of science and religion.²

Another example he provided was Glen Cole of the capitol Christian center in Sacramento.³

Richard asked the audience of freethinkers at AOF if Albert Einstein believed in God. Those who suggested that Einstein was an atheist were promptly given an "Is Your Mind Open or Closed?" questionnaire.⁴

Richard proceeded to read a quote of Einstein in which Einstein says he believes in God. Then came the question and answer period.⁵

After the meeting, a handful of AOFers continued to debate Richard as they ate lunch.

Listed below are my attempts to provide increased clarity to the proceeding sentences.

- ¹ The people to be influenced are the people in middle America. The culture they live in has been described by some to be the most religion soaked of all the industrialized countries. Studies indicate that countries that experience high levels of economic insecurity tend to be associated with high levels of religiosity. Middleclass Americans feel anxious and fearful enough to seek the assistance of a friendly creator.
- ² That would be the Templeton foundation. John Templeton, the founder, became a rich billionaire pioneering the use of globally diversified mutual funds. He declined citizenship to the United States of America and now lives in the Bahamas so that he doesn't have to pay any US. taxes. He successfully gives a \$1.5 million dollar prize each year to someone who provides

- ³ Glen Cole, the founder of the Capitol Christian Center in Sacramento. On the church property is an elementary school that transforms many a child there from a natural question-poser to a socialized question rejecter. Glen is very wealthy and successful. He encourages new church members to conform to the American Christian culture they were born into, and donate 10% of their income to his church.
- ⁴ It seemed to some in the audience that Einstein used an atheistic methodology (science) to be successful and famous and to increase his ability to be a freethinker.
- ⁵ Einstein's actions—he put gas in his car with the realization that no sky god was going to assist him...actions such as that seem to suggest Einstein was an atheist.

Historical Figures Series

The First Christian Spiritualist By Ken Nahigian

Emanuel Swedenborg, that wild old sage, couldn't sit still. He was a philosopher, a theologian, a chemist, an inventor, an anatomist, an engineer and a mystic. He was fluent in eleven languages. He wrote over 50 books. He talked to God, to angels, even to demons. And all that was OK. But they talked back—and *now* we have a story.

Swedenborg was the second son of a Lutheran bishop in

a wealthy Stockholm family. He was born January 19, 1688. His father was a "pietist," church reformer, which had got him in some slight trouble. Young Swedenborg lived with his sister's family through most of his youth, then attended the University of Uppsala to study mathematics and physical science. Graduating in 1709, he went on a world tour, to England, the Netherlands and France, indulging his fascination with science, math, philosophy, and the practical arts.

Home again, Swedenborg began Sweden's first scientific journal, which became a showcase for much of his own work. An Impressed King Charles XII apprenticed him to a famed engineer of the day. During a happy five years of training, Swedenborg produced several treatises. He was even betrothed to the engineer's daughter, though she soon jilted him for another man.


Back on the road, he eventually found public work as a mining assessor. In 1734 he published his masterwork, the *Opera Philosophica et Mineralia*, "Philosophical and Mineral Work," three huge volumes. Ostensibly a study of minerals and mining, it outlined a florid cosmology with a rough version of the nebular hypothesis, the idea that the solar system condensed from a stellar cloud. Thereafter Swedenborg's writings drifted more and more into metaphysics—in particular, to the mystery of how the soul interacts with the body, and where it dwells (in the brain, he was sure).

One pet project was a universal symbolic ("hieroglyphic") language to convey his metaphysics, which resembled Plato's theory of Ideals: the idea that the natural world is a *hypostasis*, physical representa-

tion, of the more real spirit realm. As Swedenborg saw it, the world about us, so solid seeming, is but a reflection, or shadows on a wall. But then, around 1744, he had a crisis of the spiritual kind. Swedenborg began to dream dreams and see visions. He had vivid visits from Christ. He heard voices. He fell into ecstatic trances, involving trips around the solar system, or visits to heaven or hell. Haunted, Swedenborg abandoned his practical and scientific writings, and quit his public job, to focus entirely on the new

theology and metaphysics he was slowly learning.

The custom of the day was to read the Bible fairly literally. But now he saw something else, a meaning internal, spiritual, hidden ... occult. He released an anonymous theological work, the Arcana Caelestia, which retold the Pentateuch in symbolic terms. It stirred interest in the laity but rankled the clergy. Other anonymous works followed. By bits, word leaked out that Swedenborg was the author of these outrageous expositions. In 1768, he openly signed his name to one. His political connections protected him, though some of his friends suffered grievously.

Why? What was radical about his ideas? Not the basics, surely. God, he said, was the font of love and wisdom, which reflect through

nested levels of reality, multiplied like images in mirrors held face to face, obscuring their origin. This was a bit mystical but not outrageous. He stressed the primacy of free will, which somewhat clashed with Calvinist predestination. That was bold, but not unheard-of. But Christ was a kind of shadow or reflection of God, not a distinct entity—and this denied the traditional Trinity. The "second coming" was the return of Christ's true teaching, which occurred through Swedenborg's own writing. Worse, hell has no Satan; in heaven and hell, the dead carry on their lives and habits much as on earth. In short, we make our own heaven, our own hell. The Judgment had already occurred, in 1757.

In one strange tract, Swedenborg reported that the moon is peopled by beings who speak through their stomachs, with a sound like belching.

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Building A Better Future for Sacramento Takes All of Us! Reason House: A Little History (Part 2) By Mynga Futrell

Encouraged by the response to our "new millennium vision" presentation at a HAGSA meeting, Paul Geisert and I decided that we should perhaps get serious about the possibility of transforming the audience enthusiasm for the "Reason House – A 75th Year Celebration" [pseudo]retrospective into some sort of follow-up action.

We were thinking: "Who knows? Maybe the Sacramento freethought and humanist community just might be ready to purchase a building and turn it into a local hub of freethought and humanistic activity."

Year after year, since 1994 when AOF first began meeting in Room 10 at the Sierra 2 Community Center, we had seen other small groups start out on such a path. We had witnessed a pattern with these Christian congregations. First, a brand new congregation would gather in a nearby room rented for the purpose of holding services.

Then, it wouldn't be long (less than a year, most of the time) before the group would move along to a leased building

These Christian gatherings were certainly no larger than our own, so we thought the potential was definitely there to find a place of our own. And we might even buy a building - especially if HAGSA and AOF would decide to join forces. After all, around that time (2001), we had read in the Sacramento Bee of one Oak Park congregation of even smaller size than AOF had scrimped and saved and bought a church building of considerable worth! So, why couldn't we?

We set about to produce a pamphlet that would more formally lay out the Reason House vision. We also sought (and gained) approval of both boards of directors (HAGSA and AOF) to hold a joint meeting to hear a presentation and ponder the possibilities.

I don't recall the date, but soon afterwards we arranged for both boards to meet together for dinner in the spare room at the Sichuan Garden to hear a more purposeful presentation and review the pamphlet material. That meeting concluded with a mutual vote in favor of conducting a "joint exploration" of the Reason House vision. The boards wanted at least to gauge member support



and see if enough pledges of funds (gifts or loans) could be garnered to finance the purchase of a building.

To provide greater access to information, Paul and I put the pamphlet content up on "Reason House" web pages on a website we already managed. With help from others, we designed a survey to send to members of both organizations, and an information flyer was mailed along with the survey to all members of both organizations.

From that survey, we learned that while there was a small handful of folks who felt a building was not a good idea (it would change the character of the organizations), most members of both groups were supportive, and some were very enthusiastic. The latter folks promised in writing to lend or give to the effort, and so we set up a bank account ("Reason House") at US Bank for those who wanted to start donating some small amounts right away. Then we started looking around for viable properties.

With promises sufficient to acquire a \$300K building, we engaged a realtor who was amenable to informing us of available properties in that range, and as I recall, Jerry Sloan and Don Knutson were among those folks most helpful in doing reconnaissance and investigating properties.

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Unfortunately, the market back then just would not get us what we needed in the way of meeting space and amenities for such a sum, and so after a while, exhausted by the effort, we abandoned the endeavor, took down the website, and handed all of the survey material over to Bev Church. The small amount of collected funds is now being held by AOF in a "Reason House" account, along with a much larger amount donated by a benefactor and earmarked for a building.

With the change in the commercial market and the increased "coming out" in the freethought and humanist communities, might it be time for new leaders to roll up their sleeves and give the idea another try?
