Analysis of Islam

Who is the mystery man who will bravely deconstruct Islam and its history at the AOF May general meeting? Raji Al Munir (not his real name) asked us not to display a photo, for obvious reasons. A native expatriate from an undisclosed Islamic country, a secular humanist, he is the author of the new book, Islam, God, and the New Enlightenment. Being a former Muslim who lost his faith in Islam, he is at risk, and cannot safely return to his home.

Raji will speak on the history of Islam, its roots, and the need to examine religion in general from a scientific perspective. Because of Islam's particular history, and the absence (as yet) of an Islamic Reformation, strongly Muslim cultures tend not to be open to freedom of inquiry or of scientific or social progress.



Historical Figures Series

The Cottingley Fairies By Ken Nahigian

Cousin Elsie was 16 years old, cousin Frances was 10. Newly arrived from South Africa, Francis Griffiths was living with Elsie Wright's family in Cottingley, near Bradford, England, while her father fought in the Great War. It was July of 1917. It was a summer of storms and portent.

In the garden was a stream; the girls often came back from it with wet feet. When Elsie's mother reproved them, they said they simply went to see the garden fairies. Fairies, said Elsie's mom, pshaw.

As it happened, Elsie's father was an ardent amateur photographer. The girls asked to borrow his glass-plate box camera. Amused, he agreed, and showed them how to use it. They returned it an hour later. When he developed the photoplate, it did indeed seem to show Elsie posing with a fairvsurely a clever trick. A month later the girls produced another exposed plate showing Elsie posing with a gnomish sprite. The skeptical father filed it away. But Elsie's mother wondered.

Mid-1919, she attended a meeting of the Bradford theosophical society, for a lecture on "Fairy Life." Earnest spiritualists, the Theosophists were quite serious about elves and fairies—in their view, powerful nature spirits or elementals, "devas," which we with our quaint perception might see as gauzy, winged or small, if at all. The mother produced the photo prints. Delighted, the lecturer passed them to a group leader, who authenticated them with a photographer he knew. Said the expert: these were "genuine unfaked photographs of single exposure, open-air work, show movement in all the fairy figures, and there is no trace whatever of studio work involving card or paper models, dark backgrounds, painted figures, etc." Good enough. And the prints circulated the excited theosophical community. They soon caught the eye of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle—the very Sherlock Holmes author. A passionate spiritualist, Doyle took it as sure proof of a fairy world. Besides, *Strand* Magazine had asked him to write an article on fairies for its Christmas issue, so it was a godsend. Doyle sought other expert opinions with mixed results. Kodak technicians averred that the photos indeed showed no signs of fakery (i.e., no double exposure, no spliced-in drawings), but were not "conclusive evidence" of fairy beings. Other opinions were equivocal. One was suspicious of the figures' hairstyles: "distinctly Parisienne," he noted.

But Doyle heard what he wanted to hear.

Busy with other work, Doyle sent his Theosophist friend, Edward Gardner, to Cottingley to investigate. Gardner presented Frances and Elsie with two Cameo cameras and 24 marked plates (the girls insisted that the fairies would appear to no one else). They soon produced more photos. Gardner and Doyle were ecstatic. Doyle wrote his article, and the *Strand* issue sold out within days.

Some readers believed, most scoffed. And we might scoff, seeing the photos with modern eyes. Beyond the fairy hairstyles and storybook garb, you might note a cer-

tain flatness, posed appearance, and lack of contour and shading. The texture is unreal, and shadows seem wrong. But be kind to Doyle and his Theosophist friends, so desperate for a spiritual world: popular photography was a new, scientific-seeming art, and the images convinced and enraptured them as easily as a devout Catholic might see the Virgin Mary in a water-stained wall. We see with our eyes. But we are human, and our hearts see too.

A newspaper broke the aliases Doyle had used to protect Frances and Elsie. A reporter visited, but found nothing sensational or new. Even so Doyle followed up with a second *Strand* article, then a book, *The Coming of the Fairies* (1922). More inquiries followed, more visitors to Cottingley. No further fairy evidence turned up. Had the

girls outgrown the magical childhood innocence needed to commune with the sprites? Or had they simply outgrown the game?

Eventually they married, and moved away. But over the years, clue by clue, the truth came.

In 1966, a reporter tracked down Elsie, who mused that the fairies might have been "figments of my imagination." The BBC interviewed her again in 1971. "I've told you that they're photographs of figments of our imagination," snapped Elsie, "and that's what I'm sticking to." In 1978, skeptic and stage magician James Randi investigated the fairy images, as did photography expert Geoffrey Crawley in 1982 and 1983. Both concluded the photos were fakes.

Finally in 1983, Elsie and Frances admitted they had faked the images, most of them anyway, with hand-sketched cutouts from a popular children's book of the day. They had supported the cutouts with hat pins, snapped the photos, then discarded the props. The girls disagreed on the last photograph—Elsie said it was also faked, but Frances thought it might be real. But why the lengthy farce?

It began as whimsy, Elsie said, then they were embarrassed when many adults—including the respected creator of Sherlock Homes, one of the most coolly rational, unsentimental characters in literature—fell for it. Doyle died in 1930. By then Elsie and Frances barely thought of their old jest, until the new inquiries began. After that it was all inertia, a story spinning from its own persistence.

"I never even thought of it as being a fraud," said Frances, "it was just Elsie and I having a bit of fun and I can't understand to this day why they were taken in—they wanted to be taken in." We might ask, how many other miracle or paranormal stories began so, a joke that fell among believers like sparks on straw? But we are the skeptics, the cynics, the spoilsports.

Frances died in 1986, Elsie in 1988. Most of the Cottingley Fairy material is now on display at the National Media Museum in Bradford. In 1997, Hollywood adapted it into a movie, "Fairytale: A True Story," and as usual, got the facts wrong. But never mind. The movie is good fun; and for once, let's enjoy the joke.

Andrea Griffith was AOF's April speaker. Andrea said she grew up in a Christian home. Religion seemed to help provide a type of "social glue" in the community that she grew up in. She married a very religious man who was a scripture literalist.

When she noticed that her husbands mind was more in love with a particular interpretation of the Bible than he has towards her, she sensed irreconcilable differences. Andrea questioned religious authority: What are the real intentions or religious authoritarians? She decided to get a divorce from her husband.

She also questioned the representation of "God" that was in her mind as well. All she heard was silence for half a year.



Andrea interpreted that as indifference and eventually said farewell to the "deity" that was in her mind. She then realized that she was an atheist.

The Christian community that she loved in her earlier years abandoned her.

Over time she encountered another man and is now married.

As Andrea spoke to fellow atheist at the AOF meeting, one could sense she continues to value reality over illusion. Proper argument requires us to argue not only forcefully and rationally, but also honestly. We should give the best arguments that we have to offer. It is easy to knock down weak arguments for religious belief. But there is no achievement in pinning down amateurs to the canvas. What counts is how well we do against the pros.

founder and director of both the world's first Atheist Film Festival and Evolutionpalooza, San Francisco's oldest Darwin Day celebration.




