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

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Raji Al Munir— Analysis of Islam May Meeting Recap By David Flanders

Raji Al Munir was AOF's May speaker.

His Talk was on his book "Islam, God, and the New Enlightenment.

It is a science-based analysis of the Koran, the Abrahamic God, human morality, and the future of civilization.

One of the goals of the book is to encourage those with a Muslim background to become an enlightened humanist. Raji began his talk describing the origins of Islam. He indicated that Islam is a home grown religion, similar to Christianity, invented approximately 700 years later.

The Koran promises a rewarding relationship with the supreme reality. Like other religions, it provides ad-hoc explanations of the outer world that don't agree with scientific laws of the universe.

Raji said he hopes his book will assist the reader to become more sci-

entifically and religiously literate. And in turn that will help the reader to be a more enlightened humanist.

Raji also showed a video on the Zeitgeist Movement. They have websites that suggest better ways to run the world.

During Raji's talk, he responded to many questions from the audience. He said that the majority of Muslims are moderates, that overall religion is a net negative on human progress.

He said we must move beyond the current fragmentary religion-based systems and move toward a worldwide secular-humanism-based universal and ethical values system.

Historical Figures Series

Evil's Banality

In September 2007 at the American Atheist International conference, Sam Harris recalled the American racial lynchings of early last century, how respectable bankers, doctors, lawyers, police, teachers, ministers, newspaper editors, sometimes even Congressmen and Senators, might turn out as if for a family picnic to watch the torture-death of some young man or woman, then the body hung on a tree or lamppost for public display. From our vantage it seems surreal, a fever-dream out of Hieronymus Bosch: all the fine folk in their Sunday best, men and women and children, blandly smiling, arranged and arrayed in cravats and parasols as for a postcard photo under a lacerated or cindered human body. Yet these genteel folk, who as Harris reminded us might even bring home souvenirs of body parts—teeth, ears, fingers, internal organs—were otherwise decent citizens, law abiding, loving to neighbors and pets, benevolent to strangers, and almost invariably, passionately Christian. It was as natural to them, as moral, as breathing.

To think of this must crack something open in your mind, like the fall of a facing of ice from an immense cliff to reveal a terrible geology: and that is a glimpse into the banality of evil.

Race-lynchings are an example. For another turn to Adolf Eichmann, the prime architect of the Holocaust. Jewish writer Hannah Arendt interviewed him as he awaited trial in Israel, as described in her famous 1993 book, *Eichmann in Jerusalem*. She had expected a ravaging, malevolent monster, but found an anonymous, vaguely befuddled, vaguely likable old apparatchik, a bureaucratic minion who seemed confused about all the brouhaha. Eleven million dead, well those are the

breaks, he was just doing his job, a cog in the process. After all it was *war*. Excuse me, is there a problem?

It might show in our own daily lives, in a casual acceptance of daily suffering or torture, such as the refusal to think of what really happens at factory farms or in meat packing plants, or in a muddled disinterest in war crimes or genocidal atrocities in far lands, or in the idea (reluctant, of course, for we are all good, decent, *moral* people) that sometimes torture—please, let us call it "enhanced interrogation"—is needful for public security. Within our moral geometry such torment is legitimate if we keep our distance, acceptable because we stand away. We never see the electrode-burned flesh, never hear the screams, and rarely encounter the broken, hollow-eyed, walking-wounded souls who survive it. It is *abstract*. Our leaders sanction, and we shrug.

Yet all the minions and apparatchiks—the legislators who legalize it, the President who enforces it, the attorneys who defend it, the officers who only follow orders—are perpetrators. And we too, failing to see because it has soaked its way in, insinuating

itself by inches, to find a cozy home.

Something else is quite on par with this, partaking the same banality: that is how decent, loving Christians can be blasé about Biblical atrocities, exalting in things like Old Testament child-rape or mass murder, even the "ripping open" of pregnant women, because it was long ago, and the Bible says God wanted it; or blasé about a theology that teaches that any who die in a mistaken faith, even children, must burn, sealed within a red-hot oven, forever. The screams are far, far away, and the church says not to listen. So we do not. And all is sweet and beautiful.

It is an evil abstracted, absent of malice, soft and subtle and insidious, which enters the soul like the breathing-in

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of dark fog, and becomes part of us.

But the stain is ever as red.

From Neil Gaiman's American Gods (HarperCollins, 2001):

"Look, here is a good man, good by his own lights and the lights of his friends: faithful and true to his wife, he adores and lavishes attention on his little children, he cares about his country, he does his job punctiliously as best he can. Efficiently and good-naturedly, he exterminates Jews. He appreciates the music that plays in the background to pacify them. He advises them not to forget their identification numbers as they go into the showers - many, he tells them, forget their numbers, and take the wrong clothes when they come out of the showers. This calms them. ... Our man supervises the detail taking the bodies to the ovens. If he feels bad for anything, it is that he still allows the gassing to affect him. Were he a truly *good* man, he tells himself, he would feel nothing but joy as the earth is cleansed of its pests. ...

Without individuals we see only numbers: a thousand dead, a hundred thousand dead, "casualties may rise to a million." With individual stories, the statistics become people - even that is a lie, for the people suffer in numbers that themselves are numbing and meaningless. *Look*, see the child's swollen belly, and the flies that crawl at the corners of his eyes, his skeletal limbs: will it make it easier for you to know his name, his age, his dreams, his fears? To see him from the inside? And if it does, are we not doing a disservice to his sister, who lies in the searing dust beside him, a distorted, distended caricature of a human child? And there, if we feel for them, are they now more important to us than a thousand others touched by the same famine, a thousand other young lives who will soon be food for the flies' own myriad squirming children?

We draw our lines around these moments of pain, and remain upon our islands ... They are covered with a smooth, safe, nacreous layer to let them slip, pearl like, from our souls without real pain."

In Memoriam: Norma Howe (1930-2011)

Ken Nahigian writes: Norma Howe, AOF Member, longtime FFRF Member & supporter, Shakespeare researcher and popular YA fantasy author, went away last month, leaving an hole in the world. The obituary below is from the May 3rd edition of the Sacramento Bee, page B4 (<http://www.sacbee.com/2011/05/03/3596902/obituary-norma-howe-was-young.html>)

Norma Howe, an author of lighthearted, young-adult novels that tackled age-old philosophical questions – such as whether free will exists and the conflict between faith and reason – died April 19 of thyroid cancer. She was 81.

Married in college, Mrs. Howe stayed home with her children after earning an English degree at San Jose State University while her husband taught high school in San Bernardino. She started writing confession tales for True Story and Modern Romances magazines before the family moved to Sacramento in 1962.

After her children were grown, she wrote and published eight novels and two short stories for young adults. Her first novel, "God, the Universe and Hot Fudge Sundaes," about a teenager who questions her religion after her sister is diagnosed with a terminal illness, was made into a 1986 after-school television special on CBS.

In her 1999 novel, "The Adventures of Blue Avenger," a 16-year-old boy who draws a comic strip takes on the identity of his superhero. Besides rescues, romance and humor, the story offers a look at social issues including handgun violence and asks whether life events – such as becoming a superhero – are choices or destiny.

The book was well received and led to "Blue Avenger Cracks the Code" in 2000 and "Blue Avenger and the Theory of Everything" in 2002. Her last novel, Angel in Vegas: The Chronicles of Noah Sark, was published in 2009. Mrs. Howe received favorable reviews for witty, honest and well-written novels and stories that are thought-provoking and entertaining for young people and their parents. She told The Bee that she enjoyed writing for young people be-




cause she identified with their age group.

"I'm a tomboy and have the feeling I never really grew up," she said in 1991. "Somehow, I got stuck at about age 13." Norma Claire Nadeau was born in 1930 in San Jose. She was married for 60 years and had seven children with her husband, Robert L. Howe, who retired as a state Department of Education administrator. She was predeceased by a son, Douglas.

Mrs. Howe was a well-read, charming woman with a playful nature. She went out almost daily with her husband for coffee and doughnuts or to share a banana split or ice cream sundae. Although neither smoked, they collected more than 20,000 advertising ashtrays as souvenirs.

She had a keen eye for small, everyday events that turned up in her fiction. She traveled often to Italy and other European locations where her stories were set.

Like "Blue Avenger," she questioned who wrote the plays and sonnets attributed to William Shakespeare and attended conferences of the Shakespeare Authorship Research Centre at Concordia University in Portland, Ore. "Over the years, she said The Sacramento Bee had never reviewed any of her works," her husband said. "It looks like she's finally getting that review. She'd be pleased."

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The picnic will start at 1:30 pm and run until we are through—probably around 4 pm.


