The film follows Evangelical leaders in America and Uganda, as well as politicians, as they attempt the radical task of eliminating "sexual sin" and converting Ugandans to fundamentalist Christianity. Interviews and hidden camera footage give unprecedented access into the rising influence of the evangelical movement in Uganda and the dangerous repercussions of intolerance. The film is a powerful exploration of a campaign to change African culture with values from America's Christian Right. The notorious Ugandan 'Kill the Gays' bill, largely American influenced, seeks to harshen the punishment and criminalization of homosexuality.

Dear Social IQ Lady,
I've been invited to a ceremony taking place in a Christian church. The person involved in the ceremony is a good friend and really wants me there, but I don't want to go. How can I maintain the relationship without compromising on my personal ethics? -- Jessi

Dear Jessi,
There are two things to consider when you're faced with these types of decisions: the issue and the relationship. If it's very important for you to stay clear of religious services and the relationship is not that important to you, then by all means stay home or do something else. You tell your friend, "I'm sorry, but I can't make it." If the issue isn't really that important to you but the relationship is, then you go for the sake of the relationship.

Good friends should know what we will and will not tolerate. Many atheists refuse to attend any religious ceremonies simply because they don't want to participate in systems that subjugate women, promote hatred and bigotry toward homosexuals, indoctrinate children, lie to their parishioners, sponsor legislation that reflects their religious agenda, and most importantly fertilize deception. Tolerance isn't about being a part of someone else's celebration; it's about allowing everyone to have their celebrations freely. This is something that religious institutions aren't willing to do for the non-religious.

If this friend is a good friend like you say, then that friend will understand why you're not going.




we have to educate the public that prayer is not appropriate mixed with government. Way to go, Steven! What's next?

"I felt like it went well. I'm not the best public speaker, but I hope that it spoke to peoples' conscience. Not that they'll stop city prayer, they won't. However, that is all the more reason I hope others will volunteer to pray. I

learned in this process two things: 1) there are no requirements for who can pray (i.e. I didn't need to be a minister, or in a church), and 2) the city reaches out to churches they choose asking people to pray. So, if we got atheists, pagans, Scientologists, and all the people who don't fit the city's mold to flood them with volunteer prayers... I'm have a feeling they would stop the prayer practice pretty quick once their calendar was filled with non-Christian prayers.



"Yeah, was neat to see some folks come out. I think that looked better on the news that I am just not a lone kook and lots of people think church should be outside government," Steven Vincent emailed afterward.

When I asked Steve if he could send this newsletter his written speech he replied, "I just scribbled thoughts on a post-it that I don't have anymore." Spoken like a true activist. Winging it with the confidence of a true non-believer.

I am getting married. I am planning a funeral for my dear friend or loved one. I want to celebrate my baby's entrance into this crazy world. I want these services to be reflective of my life as an atheist or reflective of the life of another humanist. It is difficult for me to assure the person charged with officiating won't bring his or her own particular religious or spiritual ideals to the service.

If you ever need a reliable non-theist, it is during the most important days of your life, or during the remembrance of a loved one's secular life. We are truly vulnerable in these situations and placing our ceremonies in the hands of the spiritual generally leads to some mention of their imaginary superhero in the sky. So what should we do? How do we know the person handling our delicate situation is going to respect our non-theism?

Fear not, there are secular officiates! That's right, if you or a loved one is in need of someone who will leave the faith out of the service, we have resources. I know for many years now I have thought about the importance of secular ceremonies. When my amazing husband and I got married we were living in Nevada. We were married in California because our dear friend and fellow non-theist could get a Deputy Commissioner's license and perform our ceremony. Not everyone is lucky enough to live in or close to a state that will allow for this. I have thought about becoming a secular officiate as well. If you have thought about it you should do it! 

More Than Two Parents Now Legal in California

Children in California can now have [more than two legal parents](#) after Governor Jerry Brown signed legislation aimed to reflect modern "changes in family structure."



The legislation was inspired by a 2011 court decision where the child of a lesbian couple was left stranded after one of her mothers was hospitalized and the other was jailed. Because a court found that the child's biological father did not have parenting rights, the child was sent to foster care.

"It is critical that judges have the ability to recognize the roles of all parents so that no child has to endure separation from one of the adults he or she has always known as a parent," state Sen. Mark Leno told the *LA Times*.

The bill, SB 274, was strongly opposed by "traditional family" advocates, who say the shifting definition of parent will complicate court proceedings. Fans of "Three Men and a Baby", however, are thrilled.

California's new law which allows children to have more than two parents has drawn the ire of "traditional family" advocates. They object that the law threatens the structure of the nuclear family, especially when such relationships do not foster heterosexual parental roles.

There may be problems with the law, such as how to distribute inheritances or child support. But rational criticism is discarded for the same "harm-to-the-children" lingo that masks the real grievance these objectors have: their religious values are not being imposed on others.

While this law does not directly affect Freethinkers, it is important to be aware of how religion mixed with the public sphere can affect the lives of people, even when it comes to private family relations. That is why Freethinkers must combat such religious encroachments. We should unite our efforts as a coalition, and bring others into the fold.

Care was taken to credit reality with the source of our hope, while reminding us that's where strength comes from when we really need it. Thought I'd share, so you could see how this atheist made her humanist reliance very clear.

Couples often recite vows at this point. I don't believe in vows. They don't hold water when you need strength or courage. I'd like to instead cite from the good books, which do hold water when we need it.

Not the books of superstition, but Shakespeare, who reminds me to stay true to myself so I cannot be false to you.

Not old tales of killings and slavery, but Aesop's fables, that tell me to appreciate what I have and strive to understand people rather than judge them.

Douglas Adams, who gives me delight in embracing the improbable. Gene Roddenberry, who shows me how to honor diversity and find universal good.

Miguel de Cervantes, who teaches me to fight windmills valiantly, even if I'm the only one.

Those are the good books I mean, and the values I bring to this marriage. These intrinsic qualities are what give us purpose and meaning in life; values that actually work when it matters.

For example, I value reality; therefore I know the real joy of kinship, laughter, and giving.

I value music and artistic expression, because it reflects our inner rebellion and consequent resolution.

I value the unknown, because not knowing is so much more delicious than not looking.



Mother's Death Made Worse by Religious Relatives

My wife's mother died recently. Having to be around all her religious relatives only hurt my wife and I further. "We must suffer" was preached. "We are sinners" was waggled at us. "She's with God now" kept us from going through a healthy mourning we could have otherwise dealt with naturally. We found the preachers, who did not know the deceased, had plenty to say, particularly about the need for their faith and their church.

As a bright contrast, when my mother was about to die, she instructed us to celebrate her life. We never had a funeral. Never had a wake or party or even a gathering, but instead we have each other and her memory. I frequently comment about something my mother taught me, or find myself instructing my own children about life as she would have. But rituals for the sake of rituals, in this secular family, aren't here to berate or punish us.

My wife's family still shuns her for her atheism, but we think our lives are all the richer and happier for it, including how we embrace death.
