Keith Swenson: A Question of Snowflakes

Sunday, August 28, 2016, 1-3pm

Snowflakes in August, yes -- clearly we have an ice theme going on here. But we can learn lots from this, besides remembering to let your little brat brother out of the freezer. Because of all areas where science and the Bible have friction, the topic of *origins* is the war zone, the scorched earth. Exactly why do evolution and <u>abiogenesis</u> kick up such emotion? It may be that by-your-bootstraps thing, auto-creation, and the idea of organization "creating itself." Even scientifically minded people struggle with that one.

But we humans are small-minded, insular thinkers. What we understand at one level may baffle us at another. The molecular world and the process of long-range natural selection are non-intuitive. We must get through a mental block, a conceptual bias. A way to do this is to observe how snowflakes and ice crystals forms. Crystallization is palpable auto-creation, a



spontaneous increase in information without intelligent meddling. It *seems* to violate the 2nd law of thermodynamics. But this mistakes the law, a misunderstanding often promulgated and exploited by creationists.

Intuition may say all things must decay into randomness, but in fact information (organization), like snowflakes, or like the delicate frost-ferns on your windowpanes in winter, often evolves spontaneously on its own. Certain systems display this strange behaviour of auto-creation all the time. Shake a shoebox of marbles, see them nest automatically into lovely hexagonal patterns. That's what we mean!

Evolution is one process of auto-creation among others. We see once we learn to look. And our speaker will help us look.

Keith Swenson comes to AOF to help us gain a better understanding of:

- Why people find it hard to accept evolution
- What the natural cognitive barrier is, and why it exists
- The role that misunderstanding randomness plays
- The role that misunderstanding entropy plays
- How complex systems display the behaviour of auto-creation
- Several examples of auto creation
- (with luck) an improved way to explain why evolution is really quite reasonable after all!

Natural vs. Supernatural

One Christian apologist I admire, somewhat grudgingly, is James Porter (JP) Moreland. Professor of Philosophy at Biola University in La Mirada, CA, Moreland has a background in analytic ontology and philosophy of science, and is even an honorary Board Member of the Internet Infidels. He seems affable and well-spoken. And I particularly like how he defines the distinction between Natural and Supernatural in a way that lets you sink your teeth into it.

Believers & skeptics often argue over this without defining terms. What exactly *is* "supernatural," and how can we know when we find it? This is an especially troubling question when you remember <u>Clarke's Third Law</u>. If "natural" simply means predictable, then certain quantum events are supernatural. But to *define* the supernatural out of existence as many do ("Anything that exists is natural"), as I have done myself, makes the whole debate seem a bit silly. Tautological. Nontestable. And ultimately, empty.

Moreland's answer—not in these words, but this is my understanding—is that the supernatural exists if the best, most coherent, most useful and parsimonious explanation for something must include some element of consciousness, teleology or subjective intent.

Suppose after much study we finally develop a model that completely explains *everything*, ties it all up in a neat knot; a model as purely mechanical as billiard balls bumping together, plus perhaps a dash of pure randomness. Then would we know the universe is natural. But suppose the final answer we are driven to is that things are a certain way only because something in them "wants" or "intends" this or that outcome. Then we would know that a bit of supernatural is in the mix.

The *something* need not be the Christian God of course, nor any god—perhaps the tooth fairy, or just some ambient, nonspecific magic. But this, to Moreland, is what *supernatural* means.

Of course it's just his definition, which you can reject if you have a better. And of course some difficultly remains in deciding what constitutes a "final" explanation. Perhaps if we work at it just a bit longer, we can reduce the perceived intentionality to more billiard ball bumpings. But at least the idea is within a conceptual box; at least we can work with it.

I might disagree with Moreland on much else, but this distinction satisfies my sense of neatness. So, yes, kudos to him.


