

➤ MRFF: A Different Fight Sunday, April 29, 2018, 1pm – 3pm Meet the Military Religious Freedom Foundation

The US military can put religious pressure on active-duty military personnel. Superior officers may push subordinates to attend and participate in faith-oriented events, often of the fundamental Evangelical variety. Illegal and unconstitutional of course—but this hasn't stopped the abuse. In 2005, advocate Mikey Weinstein founded the Military Religious Freedom Foundation (MRFF) to fight such objectionable religious compulsion.

Today the MRFF supports over 53,000 military personnel who have requested its legal help to combat the fundamentalist Christian

indoctrination they are pressured to attend. Most of these individuals are Christians, forced to participate in a shade of Christianity they don't accept; others are Muslims, Jews, Buddhists, Hindus, atheists, agnostics, Humanists, and other believers and non-.

Speaker Gregory J. Petrequin is a retired Air Force Colonel and Master Navigator who served on active duty for 27 years. He was involved in combat operations, in the air and on the ground, in Iraq and the Horn of Africa. He has a BA degree, with honours, from San Francisco State University and three master's degrees from Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University and Air University. After retiring from the military, he was a production manager for Cintas Corporation, supervising a production plant and a team of 50 partners. He is now an ardent supporter and volunteer contributor for the MRFF. AOF and Sac-FAN proudly join hands to welcome Colonel Petrequin, who will enlighten us about MRFF's critical work.

In 1995, the *Sacramento Bee*'s Religion page began to publish humanist & secular responses to moral questions alongside views from local faith leaders. AOF's own **Pat Kelley** was soon submitting her own ideas. Following is one.

November 25, 1995. Some in Congress think religious and charitable institutions, rather than the government, should provide a social and economical safety net for the poor. What do you think?

"It would be unreasonable to saddle only churches and charities with the awesome burden of ministering to millions of American poor. However, in this age of battle against "pluralistic secular democracy," there is a plan to get around this massive burden. It's based on the "Biblical Definition of Poverty," and it goes like this. The New Testament refers to three economic classes: the rich, who do not have to work for a living. The "not rich," who do not lack in daily necessities but must work for a living. The poor, who cannot sustain themselves due to illness, age or handicap and are so destitute they must depend upon charity to survive.

"The practical implications of redefining poverty are profound: it drastically reduces the number of truly needy people while totally disregarding the plight of the marginally poor who might qualify.

"Welfare needs reform, but is it really necessary to encumber religious organizations with unwanted government strings and controls while taking a pound of flesh from the most vulnerable members of society in the process?"

➤ Yuri's Night

Thursday, April 12, 2018

Yuri's Night, also called **Cosmonauts Day**, is a day honouring Yuri Gagarin, who became the first human in space on April 12, 1961. Twenty years later, on the same day the U.S. launched the first space shuttle.

The Soviet Union first celebrated Cosmonauts Day in 1962, on the first anniversary of Gagarin successful flight into space. It was celebrated annually in the USSR and then Russia. The idea for a worldwide celebration of space and technology sprang into existence at the United Nations' Space Generation Advisory Council Conference in September of 2000. The new, worldwide Yuri's Night was first celebrated on April 12, 2001 and has since become an annual international celebration.



Yuri's Night not only celebrates space and technology, but also the principles of freethinking. Once people thought that the other planets travelled around Earth. It took courage as well as intelligence for people to argue against the religiously-ordained view of the Earth as the center of the universe. Celebrating Yuri's Night not only is about celebrating his historic achievement, but all accomplishments of science that have overturned dogma and advanced our knowledge of our universe.

"Circling the earth in my orbital spaceship I marvelled at its beauty. People of the world, let us safeguard and enhance this beauty, not destroy it!" -- Yuri Gagarin
