Free Movie Nights at Reason Center

Friday, July 6 & July 20, 2018, 7pm - 10pm

Twice a month, <u>Reason Center</u> (RC) and AOF join hands to host a **Free Movie Night**. An excellent <u>MPLC License</u> makes it legit. We can't name the movies, but we can hint.

The first (July 6) is a startling 2006 documentary directed by Rachel Grady and Heidi Ewing, nominated for Best Documentary Feature at the 79th Academy Awards, about a Charismatic Christian summer camp for children.

The second (July 20) is the acclaimed 2013 sf drama, starring Sandra Bullock and George Clooney, about American astronauts stranded in space after the mid-orbit destruction of their space shuttle.

Maybe you can guess. If not, it's a matter of no gravity -- just contact Reason Center (see below). They'll tell you, then you can tell anyone.

Movie Nights are informal, picnic-style family evenings. Reason Center has a huge silver screen and a dynamic sound system. Chairs are available but may be a bit uncomfortable for a two-hour sit, so it's OK to bring blankets, pillows, lawn chairs and your own snacks & beverage, non-alcoholic please. And children are welcome if they're cool children.

In July 1995, Sacramento-area freethinkers "adopted" a two-mile stretch of Highway 99 from Elkhorn Boulevard to Elverta Road. Since then we've kept it clean of litter and debris. In fact, it is one our more successful civic efforts, showing that freethinkers can also serve the community.

So, join us! Enjoy a morning commune with nature, do a good deed for the environment and local area wildlife. The refuse that we collect would otherwise ultimately be swept by the rain into tributaries and the ocean, degrading habitat, and leading to a slow sad death for many sea creatures.

The stalwart activity captain will provide all safety equipment, including comfortable, natty hard-hats and gloves, stylish safety vests, collection bags, and handy trash pickers. The clean-up takes a scant two hours. Please dress for the season. It may be a good idea to bring a backpack or fanny-pack to carry 3 or 4 trash bags.

To find the site, travel north from Sacramento on I-5, past the old Sleeptrain Arena. Take the "Highway 99 - Yuba City, Marysville" exit. Exit at Elkhorn Boulevard less than a mile north. Turn left, cross the overpass; the park-&-ride lot will be on your left.

> Counseling Quackery with Sheldon W. Helms Sunday, July 29, 2018, 1pm – 3pm

The 60s (ah, the 60s) saw a pop psychotherapy explosion, and with it, a radioactive fallout of options for those who found the old Freudian approach wanting. Consumers now must sift through dozens of choices -- some effective, some a waste of time and money, and some downright dangerous.

So what makes an effective therapy? How can you spot the fads that masquerade as clinical psychology? How can you avoid being a victim?

Professor <u>Sheldon W. Helms</u> will describe several quack therapies – some from mainstream psychology – explaining why they are less than sound in their approach to mental health. He will also share tips on how to spot fakers and snake-oil peddlers, and provide practical advice for those interested in real therapy to improve their lives.

Sheldon is a Professor of Experimental Psychology at Ohlone College in Fremont, CA, where he serves as senior faculty member in the psychology department. He holds a master's degree in psychology and has over 20 years of teaching experience. In addition to his full-time teaching role, Sheldon serves as faculty adviser to the Ohlone Psychology Club and runs their successful Ohlone Speaker Series, hosting lectures and presentations by top-name scientists and skeptics.

Chevalier de la Barre Day

Sunday, July 1, 2018

On July 1, 1766, church authorities tortured and killed young Jean-Francois de la Barre (the "Chevalier de la Barre") for impiety. His reputed crimes? Not doffing his hat at a religious procession, singing bawdy songs, and the possession of banned books by Voltaire, a famed writer of his day and a leading critic of the Catholic Church. Outraged, Voltaire made the execution a cause célèbre, haunted by "this sentence so execrable, and at the same time so absurd, which is an eternal disgrace to France."

Civil authorities tortured the youth, cut out his tongue, then decapitated him. Eventually they burned his body on a pyre along with his copy of the book (Voltaire's *Philosophical Dictionary*).

In 1905, a statue of the Chevalier de la Barre was built in Montmartre, on the outskirts of Paris. In 1941, Nazi collaborationists removed it and melted down for munitions for the war effort - while leaving statues of saints and kings intact.

In France, Chevalier de la Barre Day often features demonstrations in his memory. Freethinkers in France and the West experience great freedom in their lives today, but in other cultures still torture and kill freethinkers and dissidents for their beliefs. Chevalier de la Barre Day is therefore a day to remember all those men and women persecuted by religion, and to campaign for the rights of those persecuted today.

AOF's 25th Anniversary Report by Mynga Futrell

Entering into its 26th year of existence, AOF hosted another excellent presentation for attendees. AOF's Program Coordinator, Suzanne McLain, introduced the speaker, Steve Clark, who came from San Jose for the afternoon. Steve provided a thoughtful and personal presentation, showing showed quite clearly the evidence leading to his title - how "Escaping a Cult Isn't Easy."

Steve's talk was followed by cake and ice cream and conversation. The sugary extras were provided to celebrate AOF's **twenty-five years** as a nonprofit organization providing a friendly "home" for atheists and other freethinkers in the Sacramento area. Current AOF President Fran Evanisko brought the decorated cake, and Secretary Christine Tweet the ice cream.



After the June 24th's formal lecture and Q&A - but before the refreshments – former AOF president and current VP Mynga Futrell took the audience on a brief "whirlwind tour" of AOF's early years. As one of the 15 co-founders, she was around for those years, starting with the initial meeting in 1993. (She mentioned that only four original founders remain, and only two of those are "physically and mentally around" these days.)

Mynga brought for display at the June 2018 celebration NN archived "annual binders" of AOF's newsletters and business materials, assembled from 1993 to 20NN. By pointing to and commenting on the individual binder titles, she was able to provide "a whirlwind tour" of AOF's accomplishments in its early years, many of which planted seeds for activism that continue today in somewhat different forms.

The "**AOF of Yore**" provided the kind of refreshing acceptance and camaraderie that enabled many persons, for the first time, to "be themselves." They could step out into the broader Sacramento community as "who they are", and some of them remain "**AOFers**" to this day.
