Twice a month, Reason Center (RC) and AOF host a **Free Movie Night** under an MPLC License. The License prohibits us from naming the movies. But we can hint.

The first (Sep 4), tentatively, is a classic 1950 American drama starring Bette Davis that received a 14 Academy Award nominations and won six, including Best Picture; critics consider it to be one of the greatest films of all time. The second (Sep 18), a 2007 romantic fantasy adventure about a small Victorian English town bordering on a magic land. A young man enters the magical realm to retrieve a fallen star, and has fantastic adventures (of course he does!). The third (Oct 2) might be an apocalyptic comedy.



Alas the regular movie venue, Reason Center (RC), is closed due to the Coronavirus lockdown. So how can you attend? You'll need a personal Netflix account + the <u>Google Chrome</u> web browser. If you don't have these, please be patient until RC can open its doors. Else, here's how to join us:

- 1. Open your Chrome web browser right now and install the Netflix Party Extension. Get it at: https://chrome.google.com/webstore/detail/netflix-party/oocalimimngaihdkbihfgmpkcpnmlaoa?hl=en. (Really, do it *now*, don't wait till movie night!)
- 2. Just before show time, fire up the Chrome browser again and go to the very special Netflix Movie Party link, which will appear on the AOF website later. Probably at the last minute, because that's how we roll.
- 3. Click the link. The Netflix Movie Party page will open. Log into Netflix (if not logged in already). At the top right of the browser frame, see a small circle with the letters NP in red. It's not easy to see, so look closely. You may need to click on the "NP".
- 4. The Netflix movie party should begin. You'll be watching it along with the rest of us. As it plays, we can chat on the side of the screen and make silly, snarkey comments.

➤ Adopt-a-Highway Cleanup Saturday, Sept 12, 2020, 9am - 11am

A certain stretch of Highway 99 runs two miles from Elkhorn Boulevard to Elverta Road – *our* stretch. Sac-area freethinkers "adopted" it in July 1995. We have cared for it, nurtured it, lovingly rescued it from litter and debris, and received recognition for our work. Our most successful civic effort, it proves freethinkers can serve the community.

So, join us please! Enjoy a morning commune with nature and do a deed for the environment and local area wildlife. The refuse we collect would otherwise ultimately be swept by the rain into tributaries and into the ocean, degrading habitat, and leading to a slow death for many creatures.



As usual, the stalwart activity captain will provide all safety equipment, including comfortable, natty hard-hats and gloves, stylish safety vests, collection bags, and handy trash pickers. The clean-up takes a scant two hours. Please dress for the season. It may be a good idea to bring a backpack or fanny-pack to carry 3 or 4 trash bags.

➤ Secular Mental Health – Candace Gorman Sunday, Sept 27, 2020, 2pm – 4pm

AOF brings Candace R.M. Gorham to you to talk about secular mental health---something some of us could use a bit more of. You in the tinfoil, you know who you are.

Candace has earned her chops. At age 18 she joined a charismatic church, which ordained her as an evangelical minister and prophetess. She cast out demons and conducted faith healings, and was determined to be the minister, wife, and mother that she was sure God wanted her to be. When financial hardship and depression drove her to consider suicide, she



dove even more deeply into the Bible and quickly became disillusioned. Questions mounted about the similarities between Jesus and earlier god-legends, the nature of god, and the concepts of hell and evil. These and other issues prompted Candace to reject belief in a deity. She later founded the <u>Ebony Exodus Project</u> to explore why record numbers of black women are leaving religion.

Now a licensed professional counselor and the author of <u>The Ebony Exodus Project: Why Some Black Women Are</u> <u>Walking Out on Religion and Others Should, Too</u>, Ms. Gorham is on the advisory council of the Black Humanist Alliance of the American Humanist Association and is a member of the Secular Therapist Project and the Clergy Project. She lives in Durham, North Carolina, with her 16-year-old daughter. No one in Durham wears a tinfoil hat.

Equinox (September)

Tuesday, September 22, 2020

The **September Equinox** is one of two days in the calendar year when day almost equal the night hours. In the northern hemisphere it is also the first day of Autumn or Fall (Gregorian calendar), called the Autumnal Equinox. (In the southern hemisphere it is the first day of Spring.)



The Autumnal Equinox marks when green things begin to shed, when growth which was young in the spring has reached maturity. Animals prepare for winter, tree leaves turn colors, and the air takes a chill. In most cultures this a time for harvest and taking stock of life's fragility. It is a time when people begin noticing the waning hours of daylight in anticipation of the winter. Since this time of year is one of the most temperate, it is also a good time to reflect on the meaning of life.

In every culture the Autumnal Equinox signals the return of weather that favors slowing down, introspection, and conservation. Many cultures celebrate the harvest as a means to defeat the starvation brought on by winter. It is also a time closely associated with the dead. Though the dead do not return to life nor walk the earth this time of the year, it is well to remember or memorialize those who are no longer with us. For freethinkers the Autumnal Equinox is a great time to celebrate the lives of those who contributed to the freethought movement. It is also a perfect day to contemplate your own thoughts on the meaning you invest in life and share those thoughts with others.

Banned Book Week

Sunday, Sept 27 - Saturday, Oct 3, 2020

September's end marks **Banned Books Week**, a celebration of the Freedom to Read, established by the American Library Association in 1981 in response to growing attempts to ban books in public libraries across the country. First observed in 1982, we celebrate it each year during the last week starting in September, to remind us not to take for granted their freedom to read the written word.

Every year bookstores and libraries across the United States celebrate Banned Books Week with displays of and readings from books that have been banned or threatened throughout history. Such works range from the *Bible* and Thomas Paine's *The Age of Reason* to Shakespeare's *Hamlet*, Mark Twain's *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn* and J.K Rowling's *Harry Potter* series, and has included books on atheism, science, tolerance, social issues, love and sex, and philosophy. Jean-Jacques Rousseau, Thomas Paine, Voltaire, Aristophanes, Margaret Sanger, Mary Shelley, Ambrose Bierce, Charles Darwin, George Eliot, Mark Twain and John Locke were all victims of censorship during their lifetimes and still face censorship in some sections of the world today.



Banned Books Week stands as a reminder that freedom is precious, that without constant diligence and defiance we can lose it, even in the United States. If anything, this should motivate freethinkers everywhere to read banned books, discuss them, and protect the rights of all Americans to read what they want, when they want, in libraries across the country.

> Blasphemy Day

Wednesday, September 30, 2020

Secularists and freethinkers worldwide celebrate <u>International Blasphemy Day</u> or "Blasphemy Rights Day" to mark the day when images of Muhammad appeared in the Denmark newspaper *Jyllands-Posten* in 2005. Conservative Muslims reacted to the drawings with worldwide protests, riots, embassy burnings and death threats.

Formally founded in 2009 by Ronald Lindsay, Directory of the Center of Inquiry in Ahmherst, New York, and promoted by the <u>Campaign for Free Expression</u>, this secular holiday now stands as a platform for individuals freely to express criticisms of religion and religious establishments. As Ronald Lindsay said in a television interview: "... religious beliefs should be subject to examination and criticism just as political beliefs are, but we have a taboo on religion."

"... we're against restrictions on speech based purely on the possibility that some people might be offended," he also said; "Because if you go down that path there's no end to it."

Participants have celebrated Blasphemy Day in various ways: with speeches, art exhibitions, feasts, poetry, music and song, and by taking the <u>Blasphemy Challenge</u>. Use your imagination.

The Vegetarian Hermit



OME OF ROBERT CRABB'S contemporaries were unsympathetic enough to connect his unorthodox religious career with the fact that his skull was cracked open by a battle axe in the English Civil War (1642–1651). Sheer scuttlebutt.

In fact, it had already started by then. The Spirit put him on a diet of vegetables, water and celibacy in 1641. Not the first person to go that way, but in Catholic-hating Puritan circles it was seriously unexpected.

Next, he moved to Uxbridge, where he became a hermit and dispensed herbal remedies to a constant stream of visitors, mostly women. He made his own clothes and enjoyed the humble art of prophecy rather more than the next person, getting denounced as a witch in the process.

His next career move was to start selling homemade hats. His inner light revealed that it was a sin to make a profit, but somehow, his business survived for three years, during which time he may well have bequeathed to the English language the saying, "as mad as a hatter". A further reading of the Bible convinced him to sell everything he had and give the money to the poor, which didn't help his reputation, or to be honest the poor all that much.

Next he felt convicted to eliminate the carnal extravagance of potatoes and carrots from his luxurious vegan teetotal lifestyle. He ended up on bran soup, turnips and bean pudding. Yet still he was not satisfied. Not many people would be, I suppose. But further revelation persuaded him that his problem was still, surprisingly enough, self-indulgence. He spent the rest of his life on dock leaves and grass, and an income of a penny every four months.

Regrettably, he only ever had one convert to this rather demanding way of life. The name was Captain Northwood, from Philadelphia. The Captain died shortly afterwards of malnutrition.
