So to attend this, you'll need a personal Netflix account + home computer with the <u>Google Chrome web browser</u>. If you don't have these we apologize -- please be patient until RC can open its doors. Else, here's how to join us:

- Open your Chrome web browser right now and install the Netflix Teleparty Extension from: <u>https://www.netflixparty.com/</u>. (Really, do it *now*, don't wait till movie night!)
- 2. Just before show time, fire up the Chrome browser again and go to the very special Netflix Movie Telepary link, which will appear on the AOF Website minutes before 7pm that day.
- Click that link. The Movie Teleparty page will open. Log into Netflix (if not logged in already). At the top right of the browser frame check your "Extensions" list. Find the letters Tp in red. You may need to click on the letters. (If you can't see the Tp, look for the little puzzle-piece icon in the upper right, click, then you'll see it.)

> Why Smart People Fall for Fake News

Sunday, April 25, 2021, 2pm - 4pm

You're smart, right? You make decisions, you rely on reason, you reject superstition. Yet in many cases, smart people are more likely to fall for fake news than average minds! Research in cognitive neuroscience and behavioral economics shows that some kinds of misinformation are a special kryptonite for smart people. This arises from a dangerous judgment error called *cognitive bias*.

Learn how you might be vulnerable to fake news, find out what you can do to fix that, and see how to help prevent other people from falling for fake news as well. You'll be a superhero.

Dr. Gleb Tsipursky is a cognitive neuroscientist and behavioral economist passionate about truth, rational thinking, and wise decision-making. A civic activist and philanthropist, he's the volunteer President of the Board of the nonprofit Intentional Insights (https://intentionalinsights.org) and co-founded the Pro-Truth Pledge (www.protruthpledge.org). Professionally, he serves as the CEO of the decision-making and risk management strategy consulting, coaching, speaking, and training firm Disaster Avoidance Experts (https://disasteravoidanceexperts.com). He's a best-selling author of a number of books, most notably *Pro Truth: A Pragmatic Plan to Put Truth Back into Politics* (Changemakers Books, 2020), as well as the national bestsellers *The Truth Seeker's Handbook: A Science-Based Guide* and *Resilience: Adapt and Plan for the New Abnormal of the COVID-19 Coronavirus Pandemic*. He has published over 550 articles and has given over 450 interviews for prominent venues such as *Time, USA Today, Scientific American, Psychology Today, Fortune, The*





Conversation, Inc. Magazine, CNBC, CBS News, NPR, *Newsweek*, and more. A nonbeliever, he frequently writes for secular venues such as *The Humanist, Skeptical Inquirer, The Skeptic*, and *Free Inquiry*. His expertise stems from his research background with over 15 years in academia, including seven years as a professor at the Ohio State University, where he published dozens of peer-reviewed articles in academic journals such as *Behavior and Social Issues* and *Journal of Social and Political Psychology*. > April Fools Day

Thursday, April 1, 2021

For decades, **April Fool's Day** has been a celebration of nonsense. Practical jokes and other foolish activities mark the morning hours of April 1st. But by one tradition, all foolish behavior must cease by noon, or roles will be reversed, and the joke will be on you!

Foolery abounds in our 21st Century culture; April Fool's Day offers to groups, organizations and individuals committed to minimizing the nonsense and gobbledygook in our world, a chance to educate and enlighten the public through fun events and activity. It also gives us an opportunity to commemorate Steve Allen by recognizing <u>Dumbth</u> as the Book of the Month.

> Yuri's Night, Cosmonauts Day Monday, April 12, 2021

Yuri's Night, also called Cosmonauts Day honors Yuri Gagarin, who became the first human in space on April 12, 1961. Twenty years later on the same day the U.S. launched the first space shuttle.

The Soviet Union first celebrated Cosmonauts Day in 1962, on the first anniversary of Gagarin successful flight into space. It was celebrated annually in the USSR and then Russia. The idea for a worldwide celebration of space and technology sprang into existence at the United Nations' Space Generation Advisory Council Conference in September of 2000. The new, worldwide Yuri's Night was first celebrated on April 12, 2001 and has since become an annual international celebration.

Yuri's Night not only celebrates space and technology, but also the principles of freethinking. Once people thought that the other planets travelled around Earth. It took courage as well as intelligence for people to argue against the religiously-ordained view of the Earth as the center of the universe. Yuri's Night is not only about celebrating his historic achievement, but all accomplishments of science that have overturned dogma and advanced our knowledge of our universe.

Yuri's Night has become an international phenomenon since its introduction in 2001. Every year coordinators and participants look to broaden the spectrum of events held. The range of events is as diverse as the people who hold them; even residents of the International Space Station have been known to join in the fun. Whether in someone's living room, a nightclub or a world-class science museum, Cosmonauts Day events all have one thing in common: people who are excited about space exploration, science, freethought, and want to join together to celebrate it. Participating in Cosmonauts Day isn't difficult: if finding an already existing party near is hard, then get your friends together call it a Yuri's Night party. Getting people to think about space, science, and freethought is the focus no matter the venue.

Ask An Atheist Day

Thursday, April 15, 2021

<u>National Ask an Atheist Day</u>, a movable secular holiday, occurs twice each year -- on the 3rd Thursday of April (anywhere from April 15 to April 21) and on the 3rd Thursday of September (Sept 15 to Sep 21). As if atheists don't have enough to do already.

"NAaA Day" is an opportunity for secular groups across the country to dispel stereotypes about atheism and to encourage constructive, courteous dialogue between believers and nonbelievers. And it is an opportunity for the general public—particularly people of faith—to approach non-theists and ask questions about secular life. Please don't be afraid to spark up a discussion with us, we won't bite. Most don't, anyway.

The first NAaA Day was in February of 2011, when members of the <u>Secular Student</u> <u>Alliance</u> (SSA) at the University of Illinois set up a table with a sign that said "Ask an

Atheist." The next month an article appeared in the *Friendly Atheist website*, written by a "Guest Contributor" (probably an SSA member), saying the event was a smashing success and the Illinois group hoped to take the day nationally. "The SSA is ready to help," it added. Since then the day has occurred across the nation each April, and soon in September as well.

For those interested, it helps to know a bit about atheism. Of course the point is to ask atheists questions, but here is some background. Generally, atheists have no belief in deities, which is not *quite* the same as a positive belief no deity exists. The prefix "a" just means "without." Atheism has no set ideology—atheists may be humanists, rationalists, Unitarian Universalists, postmodernists, secularists, among other things. Historically, Greek and Roman philosophers and writers such as Epicurus, Democritus, and Lucretius had an influence on what would become atheism. The term didn't appear until the sixteenth century, a time when freethought and skepticism began to flourish. Some that lived during the Age of Enlightenment were the first to identify themselves as atheists. The supremacy of human reason was a facet of the French







Revolution, and it was at this time that atheism first became used politically. Science also began to lock horns with orthodox religion during the second half of the nineteenth century.

Today it is challenging to estimate how many atheists are in the world. A 2015 poll claimed about 11% of the world's population are atheists, and a 2012 poll claimed the number to be 13% (both WIN/Gallup International polls). A BBC poll from 2004 put the number at 8%. Europe and Asia seem to have the largest number of atheists. In 2015, 61% of Chinese citizens identified as atheists.

How to observe the day. If you call yourself an atheist, you can celebrate the day in a variety of ways. For example, set up a table where believers and others can come up to you and ask you questions about atheism, secular living, and your beliefs (or nonbeliefs). You can <u>email</u> the SSA for supplies for your table, such as brochures, <u>stickers</u>, posters, and flyers. You could also wear the stickers and put flyers up on campus (flyers could be put up before the day as well). You could organize an "ask an atheist" panel event, or go on a radio station and have an "ask an atheist" segment where listeners are able to call in and ask you questions about atheism. When posting on social media, use the hashtag #askanatheist.

Earth Day Thursday, April 22, 2021

Earth Day is a day to grow and diversify the environmental movement, and to mobilize our resources to promote a healthy, sustainable planet. Earth Day is the only Secular Holiday celebrated simultaneously around the globe by people of all backgrounds, faiths and nationalities. More than a half billion people participate in Earth Day campaigns every year.



U.S. Senator Gaylord Nelson founded Earth Day in 1970 to push the environment onto the national agenda. It is an inclusive event, attracting people of all religions and beliefs. Non-religious groups have many reasons to celebrate Earth Day: those who don't believe in heaven

or divine intervention realize that this world is all we have and that it is in our hands to protect it. Those who believe that the scientific method is the best way to gain understanding of our world, can also use Earth Day to promote the best available science about environmental issues. Secular groups can use this annual event to network with environmental groups and other organizations.

You can celebrate Earth Day in many different ways. Events across the globe are often designed to bring notice of the environment to lawmakers. Events also take place on college and school campuses. Meetings intended for the sole purpose of attracting attention to the cause are the most common; these meetings often employ music, speakers, and other attractions to generate attention.

Secular Survey – please help

Joe Blankholm, a professor at the University of California, Santa Barbara along with Juhem Navarro-Rivera, Ph.D., and Dusty Hoesly, Ph.D., are conducting a survey of members of secular communities in the United States. The group has been researching secular and nontheist people for several years, and they themselves identify as secular. They have announced a new project called The Secular Communities Survey (see https://secularcommunities.hfa.ucsb.edu).

This will be the largest-ever study of the community life of nonbelievers. Please participate and encourage other nontheists you know to participate. Go to <u>https://secularcommunities.com/scs</u> to access the survey. It's entirely anonymous and takes about 15-20 minutes to complete. It will ask about secular political views and degrees of civic engagement. The research and survey results will be important for scholars of community life in the United States.
