

- 1. Open your Chrome web browser right now and install the "Netflix Teleparty" Extension. Get it at: https://www.netflixparty.com/. (Really, do it *now*, don't wait till movie night!)
- 2. Just before show time, fire up the Chrome browser again and go to the very special Netflix Movie Teleparty link, which will appear on the AOF events calendar about a half hour before showtime.
- 3. **Click that link.** The Movie Teleparty page will open. Log into Netflix (if not logged in already). At the top right of the browser frame check your "Extensions" list. Find the letters **Tp** in red. You must click on the letters.
- 4. The Netflix movie party should begin. You'll be watching it along with the rest of us. As it plays, we can chat on the side of the screen and make silly, snarky comments.

Free Movie Night was set up for Reason Center members, but non-members are welcome too. RC *may* beg a small (voluntary) donation to cover costs. How can you do that? A tidy stretch of Highway 99 runs two miles from Elkhorn Boulevard to Elverta Road -- *our* stretch! Sac-area freethinkers "adopted" it in July 1995. It is tidy because we have cared for it, nurtured it, lovingly rescued it from litter and debris, and received recognition for our work. As one of our more successful civic efforts, it proves freethinkers can also serve the community.

So join us please! Enjoy a morning commune with nature, and do a deed for the environment and local area wildlife. The refuse we collect would otherwise ultimately be swept by the rain into tributaries and into the ocean, degrading habitat, and leading to a slow death for many sea creatures.



As usual, the stalwart activity captain will provide all safety equipment, including comfortable, natty hard-hats and gloves, stylish safety vests, collection bags, and handy trash pickers. The cleanup takes a scant two hours. Please dress for the season. It may be a good idea to bring a backpack or fanny-pack to carry 3 or 4 trash bags.

Chevalier de la Barre Day

Thursday, July 1, 2021

Mainly a French observance, **Chevalier de la Barre Day** is for all who opposes religious oppression. It marks the execution of the Chevalier de la Barre for impiety.

On July 1, 1766, church authorities tortured and killed young Jean-Francois de la Barre (the "Chevalier de la Barre" because he held the title of Chevalier or "knight") for impiety. His reputed "crimes" included not doffing his hat at a religious procession, singing bawdy songs, and the possession of banned books by Voltaire, a famed writer and leading critic of the Catholic Church. Outraged, Voltaire made the execution a cause célèbre, haunted by "this sentence so execrable, and at the same time so absurd, which is an eternal disgrace to France," because a key piece of evidence used against La Barre was La Barre's possession of Voltaire's *Philosophical Dictionary*.

The Chevalier and two young friends had been accused of defacing a crucifix in the French town of Abbeville. None saw this happen, but local clergy harassed and harangued the villagers until a few, fearing excommunication, vaguely recalled three youths who had not removed their hats at a recent Catholic procession. They pointed out La Barre and his friends. Once charged, one of the youths fled to Holland, and one (only 15 years old) was simply fined. Only the 19 year old La Barre remained. A search of his home turned up three forbidden books. The courts and the church decided they had their ideal suspect. Mercilessly they tortured him, cut out his tongue, and decapitated him. Eventually they burned his body on a pyre along with his copy of Voltaire's book.

In 1905, a statue of Jean-Francois, Chevalier de la Barre was built in Montmartre, on the outskirts of Paris. In 1941, Nazi collaborationists removed it and melted down for munitions for the war effort – while leaving statues of saints and kings intact.

In France, Chevalier de la Barre Day often features demonstrations in his memory. Today, freethinkers in France and the West experience great freedom in their lives, but in other cultures still torture and kill freethinkers and dissidents for their beliefs. Sunday, July 11, 2021



Rabbinical story: Why did God create atheists?

Teaching the Talmud, a Rabbi explained that God created everything in this world to be appreciated, since everything is here to teach us a lesson. A clever student asked, "What lesson can we learn from atheists? Why did God make them?"

The Rabbi answered, "God created atheists to teach us the most important lesson of them all -- the lesson of true compassion. You see, when an atheist performs an act of charity, visits someone who is sick, helps someone who is in need, and cares for the world, he is not doing so because of some religious teaching. He does not believe that God commanded him to perform this act. In fact, he does not believe in God at all, so his acts are based on an inner sense of morality. And see the kindness he can bestow upon others simply because he feels it to be right!

"This means" the Rabbi continued, "that when someone reaches out to you for help, you should never say 'I pray that God will help you.' Instead for the moment, become an atheist. Imagine that there is no God who can help and say, 'I will help you.'"

John the Baptist

In the Gospel account, John the Baptist was beheaded in Galilee near the beginning of Jesus' mission on earth. Luke 7:19–21 also has John send two of his disciples to Jesus, which shows Jesus knew of his plight.

The reality may be quite different. The gospels and the first-century Jewish historian Josephus disagree on almost every detail regarding the death of John the Baptist, including the year of John's death.

Josephus tells us that the wedding between Herod and Herodias occurred in 34 CE, and that Herod had John taken to a remote fortress at Macherus, east of the Dead Sea, with the intention to execute John before he could stir up the Jews in revolt. Here is the relevant text from Book 18 of *Antiquities of the Jews*:

Now many people came in crowds to him, for they were greatly moved by his words. Herod, who feared that the great influence John had over the masses might put them into his power and enable him to raise a rebellion (for they seemed ready to do anything he should advise), thought it best to put him to death. In this way, he might prevent any mischief John might cause, and not bring himself into difficulties by sparing a man who might make him repent of it when it would be too late. Accordingly John was sent as a prisoner, out of Herod's suspicious temper, to Macherus, the castle I already mentioned, and was put to death.

That the wedding took place in the mid-thirties CE is confirmed by the action of King Antipas of Nabatea, who attacked and defeated Herod Antipas in 36 CE because of the slight to his daughter, whom Herod divorced in order to marry Herodias. This also confirms that the execution took place in 35 or early 36 CE, because the Jews believed that the defeat of Herod was divine retribution for the execution of John the Baptist, meaning that the execution was still fresh in their minds.

These references are strong evidence that John the Baptist was executed on the direct orders of Antipas some years after the crucifixion of Jesus (which is estimated at between 30 and 33 CE).

Is it a bird? Is it a plane? ... No, it's St Christina the Astonishing

THE MEDIEVAL LEGEND of <u>St Agatha</u> puts me in mind of St Christina the Astonishing, a 12th-century Belgian saint who also had miraculous breasts. Yes, there's more to her story, and I know I shouldn't fixate on that one part. But I'm 38 and it's too late to change my ways now.

At age 21, the orphan peasant Christina had a fit and died. During her funeral she revived and floated up into the church roof. The priest insisted she come down, so she landed on the altar and told her erstwhile mourners that she had been to heaven, hell and purgatory, the whole tour.

She had some eye-opening revelations about whom she had seen where, but her main intelligence was that human beings stank from sin. She ran off to begin a new ministry of prayer, vicarious suffering for souls in purgatory, and floating as high as possible to avoid the smell.


She sat in burning ovens and icy rivers, swam under mill wheels and leapt from treetop to treetop. She lived in rags and was chased about the country as a lunatic or demoniac. Sometimes she was chained by her own family, but escaped into the forest.

The Lord provided food for her on such occasions, but she had become rather fussy – she found human food like "swallowing the bowels of frogs."

"You've never eaten the bowels of frogs," my mum would have said. "Eat it or go hungry."

But the Lord was more sympathetic to Christina's dietary requirements and worked a miracle, allowing her to breastfeed herself. Her virginal breasts also produced oil which she dipped her bread into and which she used to treat her sores.

Christina was undoubtedly a real person, her life written by a contemporary, and she lived to the age of 70, though opinions were divided about whether she was holy, mad or demon possessed. In making her patron saint of the insane, the Church seems to have gone for some from column A and some from column B. Good call.
