

> April Fools Day Saturday, April 1, 2023

For decades, April Fools Day has been a celebration of nonsense. Practical jokes and other foolish activities mark the morning hours of April 1st. By one tradition, all foolish behavior must cease by noon, or roles will be reversed, and the joke will be on you!

Foolery abounds in our 21st Century culture; April Fools Day offers to groups, organizations and individuals committed to minimizing the nonsense and gobbledygook in our world, a chance to educate and enlighten the public through fun events and activity. It also gives us an opportunity to commemorate Steve Allen by officially recognizing *Dumbth* as the Book of the Month.



➤ Yuri's Night, or Cosmonauts Day Wednsday, April 23, 2023

Yuri's Night, also called **Cosmonauts Day**, is in honor of Yuri Gagarin, who became the first human in space on April 12, 1961. Twenty years later on the same day the U.S. launched the first space shuttle.

The Soviet Union first celebrated Cosmonauts Day in 1962, on the first anniversary of Gagarin successful flight into space. It was celebrated annually in the USSR and then Russia. The idea for a worldwide celebration of space and technology sprang into existence at the United Nations' Space Generation Advisory Council Conference in September of 2000. The new, worldwide Yuri's Night was first celebrated on April 12, 2001 and has since become an annual international celebration.




Yuri's Night not only celebrates space and technology, but also the principles of freethinking. Once people thought that the other planets travelled around Earth. It took courage as well as intelligence for people to argue against the religiously-ordained view of the Earth as the center of the universe. Celebrating Yuri's Night not only is about celebrating his historic achievement, but all accomplishments of science that have overturned dogma and advanced our knowledge of our universe.

> Ask An Atheist Day Thursday, April 20, 2023

National Ask an Atheist Day is a movable secular holiday occurring twice each year -- on the 3rd Thursday of April (anywhere from April 15 to April 21), and the 3rd Thursday of September (from Sept 15 to Sep 21). As if atheists don't have enough to do already.





The first NAaA Day was in February of 2011, when members of the <u>Secular Student Alliance</u> (SSA) at the University of Illinois set up a table with a sign that said "Ask an Atheist." The next month an article appeared in the <u>Friendly Atheist website</u>, written by a "Guest Contributor" (probably an SSA member), saying the event was a smashing success and the Illinois group hoped to take the day nationally. "The SSA is ready to help," it added. Since then NAaA Day has occurred across the nation each April since, and soon in September as well.

The day is meant to be filled with respectful dialogue, so make sure to participate in such a way, no matter if you are an atheist or the person asking questions.

➤ Earth Day Saturday, April 22, 2023

Earth Day is a day to grow and diversify the environmental movement, to mobilize our resources to promote a healthy, sustainable planet. Earth Day is the only Secular Holiday celebrated simultaneously around the globe by people of all backgrounds, faiths and nationalities. More than a half billion people participate in Earth Day campaigns every year.

U.S. Senator Gaylord Nelson founded Earth Day in 1970 to push the environment onto the national agenda. It is an inclusive event, attracting people of all religions and beliefs. Non-religious groups

have many reasons to celebrate Earth Day: those who don't believe in heaven or divine intervention realize that this world is all we have and that it is in our hands to protect it. Those who believe that the scientific method is the best way to gain understanding of our world, can also use Earth Day to promote the best available science about environmental issues. Secular groups can use this annual event to network with environmental groups and other organizations.

You can celebrate Earth Day in many different ways. Events across the globe are often designed to bring notice of the environment to lawmakers. Events also take place on college and school campuses. Meetings intended for the sole purpose of attracting attention to the cause are the most common; these meetings often employ music, speakers, and other attractions to generate attention.







Utah lawmakers allowed book banning; a parent went after the Bible

Parent submitted a detailed request to get Bible banned due to inappropriate content

Conservatives in several states have moved to ban books deem inappropriate for children because they cover racism, sex, and LGBTQ relationships in ways that make certain parents very uncomfortable. The books themselves aren't graphic, much less pornographic, but fear-mongering has been effective, especially in states like Texas and Florida. Utah too. Last year, lawmakers passed a bill paving the way for the banning of school books that contain "pornographic or indecent" content. Those words, however, are not defined, allowing groups to declare just about anything they don't like as unfit for kids. But at least one parent decided to kick conservatives where it hurts: in their favorite holy book.

According to reporter Courtney Tanner of the Salt Lake Tribune, a parent submitted a formal request last December to get the Bible banned from Davis High School in Kaysville. The newspaper received a copy of it via a public records request. While the submitter's name is redacted, the content of the request is glorious. "Incest, onanism, bestiality, prostitution, genital mutilation, fellatio, dildos, rape, and even infanticide," the parent wrote in their request, listing topics they found concerning in the religious text. "You'll no doubt find that the Bible, under Utah Code Ann. § 76-10-1227, has 'no serious values for minors' because it's pornographic by our new definition."

"Get this PORN out of our schools," the parent wrote. "If the books that have been banned so far are any indication for way lesser offenses, this should be a slam dunk." The parent in question didn't just say all this. Included in the demand was an 8-page list of specific verses that justified the request. The parent also included this bit of sarcasm when introducing the list: "I thank the Utah Legislature and Utah Parents United for making this bad faith process so much easier and way more efficient. Now we can all ban books and you don't even need to read them or be accurate about it. Heck, you don't even need to see the book!"

Was it trolling? Sure. But the request is superficially no different from the ones conservative parents are making, and the school district says it will review the request just as it does all the others they've received. (It's taking a while because there's a backlog.) The point is obvious: Just because a book mentions sex (or any other potentially controversial topic) doesn't mean it deserves to be banned from school shelves. Children should have the option of reading what they want—and easy access to books that other people (including adults!) may not want them to read. If conservatives are targeting young adult novels that talk about same-sex attraction, just to name one example, then there's no reason everyone else shouldn't target holy books which are far more offensive. That includes the *Book of Mormon*. If the passages in those religious books were written as a young adult novel, you can bet conservatives would ban those, too.

To be clear, the purpose of calling for a ban on the Bible isn't to actually ban the Bible. It's to highlight the absurdity of book-banning, period. The solution isn't to toss the Bible out of school for children who may want to read it; it's to make sure public school students have access to all kinds of literature.
