A Non-Forum / Non-Debate at UC-Davis Slick Proselytizing of Intelligent Design on Campus By Jerry Bachman

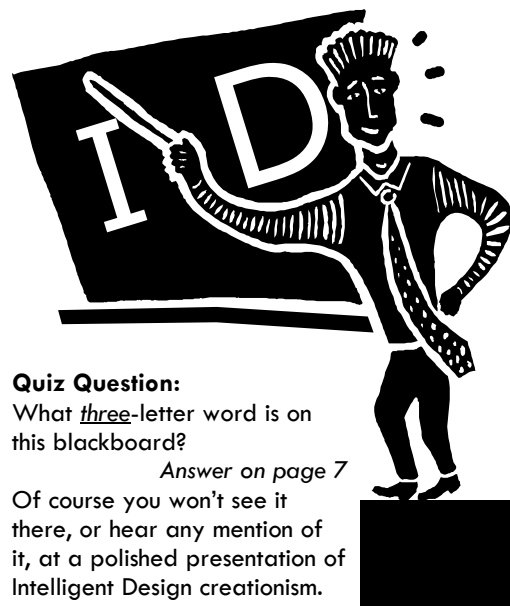
Standard Fare

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On February 2, the University of California at Davis hosted a sold-out event in its large, on-campus Freeborn Hall. At five dollars a seat, over five hundred attended the “evolution or intelligent design?” function sponsored by a student group known as the Campus Crusade for Christ.

Billed as “A Skeptics Forum and Scientific Scholar Panel Debate,” the two featured speakers were Dr. Hugh Ross and Dr. Fazale Rana, both from Reasons to Believe, a Christian “ministry established to

The AOF Line

This month, I continue exploring the American Humanist Association's Grassroots Manual (AHAGM) by sharing information from section five, "Building Community."

AOF's regular meetings offer some of our best opportunities for community building. AOF has a greeter to welcome new and returning members. The organization supplies name tags to assist with recognition of members, provides new attendees with information packets, and welcomes all new persons publicly with a general greeting prior to each meeting's main program event.

The AHAGM recommends putting the following community building materials into a monthly newsletter to keep members involved: meeting and event summaries or minutes, as well as member-focused information. One suggestion is to announce life milestones in an organization's newsletter. Examples include births, deaths, weddings, graduations, recovery from illness, job promotions, and members' involvement with the local community (perhaps through volunteering or politics). One suggestion is also to announce new members in the newsletter.

Group dynamics is a topic the manual suggests the following principles found in the book, "Community Building: What Makes It Work":... having self-awareness and self-understanding within the group; coalition efforts and connections with outside groups; democracy and open leadership; training (specifically assigning a mentor to each new volunteer to show them the ropes to running the group); and

having a focus on performing tasks that benefit the members.

Several projects are suggested to help build community. The "Humanist Communities" program serves the functions of a local group, but also provides a stronger focus on issues affecting families and community aspects of the group.

The intention of Humanist Communities is also to provide an environment for children to feel normal, and to learn practical, positive aspects of what it means to be an atheist. The manual also recommends establishing a subgroup focused on families, where families (who already have tight schedules) can participate. Perhaps families could rotate babysitting duties, or even pursue a "Sunday school" to teach ethics and provide identity.

With regards to owning a building, the AHAGM recognizes that most organizations (and AOF is no exception) do not have the funds to immediately purchase property. Instead, they suggest putting the ownership of a building into a strategic plan and budget. Set a target of how much money to raise

each year for a building fund. This means a longer time period for collection of funds, but it also points the group down the right path. The manual cautions, however, that groups

shouldn't buy property in order to create community. Rather, buying property should be the natural outcome of an already strong and healthy community.

That's all for this month. In April, we'll investigate Educational Development.

The purpose of the organization, AOF, is to promote the civic understanding and acceptance of atheism in our community.

A Brief Conceptual Reiteration Experimental Study of Evolution

For those of you who had a bit of trouble catching all the biology that Dr. Krubitzer presented, here is a brief recap.

Darwin and Wallace presented to the world the naturalistic description of the pathway of life leading to humans, and for a long time afterwards, the largest fraction of work on evolution was *observation* followed by *explanations* and *theories* regarding what was observed. This work was sufficient to firmly establish Darwin's Theory of Evolution through Natural Selection as a very powerful and accurate description of how current life forms (and humanity) developed from lower forms of life.

Here are a couple of basic ideas. Evolution, the change of species over time, is a fact. The amount of evidence in fossil forms, biochemistry, genetics, and so forth is overwhelmingly substantial. Once evolution as a fact was established, the next scientific step was to explain how evolution happened. Darwin's answer to this

"how" question was his proposition of natural selection.

In every species, the number of individuals reproduced each generation far exceeds the carrying capacity of the environment. Thus, each generation, many offspring die and few carry onwards. Darwin also noted that all individuals in a given species demonstrate individual traits, and that some traits help individuals to live and some don't help as much. Thus a culling from the many offspring sometimes results in systematic changes over many generations.

Dr. Krubitzer's work is quite different from the work that was carried out by biologists in Darwin's era (and for many years thereafter). She is *experimentally* studying the evolution of the brain. She is manipulating a set of variables in the brain, as contrasted with *observing* what nature presents to the observer.

A Brief Darwin Day Recap

The featured speaker for this year's Darwin Day, Dr. Leah Krubitzer, said she was brought up as a Catholic and that at age 20 she read "The Origin of Species" by Charles Darwin. In the book, Darwin at times seemed more interested in the similarities of various animals than in the differences. When studying the brains of certain animals, Darwin noted similarities in their cortexes. Leah was taken with the insights Darwin shared in the book and so, with sophisticated brain-imaging techniques, she did some of her own research. During her time in Australia she dissected every animal that was on a coin. She said she changed from a believer in God, to an agnostic, to an angry atheist, to (now) an atheist. It does appear to me that science is the superior type of knowledge that is helping scientists gain an improved mechanistic model of how evolution built the brain Darwin started us thinking about that, and Leah shared a part of where that history is now on Darwin Day. After she spoke, in order to "evolve into" a more casual atmosphere, Paul and Mynga sang a song from the Wizard of Oz ("If I Only Had a Brain") to the delight of the audience. Evolution-related T-shirts and other paraphernalia were for sale. Evolution vs. creationism literature was also available. Refreshments were served. Hopefully, one day creationism will be retired to the graveyard of bad ideas, but until then, Freethought groups in Sacramento and elsewhere will continue to host a Darwin Day each year.

"This one-man play recounts the life of the famous trial lawyer, known best for the defense of a teacher charged with teaching the theory of evolution in a case that became known as the 'Scopes Monkey Trial.'

Darrow was, like all of us, a product of his times. For him, it was a time of social conflict. The radical left was at its peak of influence, conflicting with the power of the Klu Klux Klan, Jim Crow laws, lynchings, union unrest and xenophobia. He spoke to the hearts and minds of the American people to win the case for legal and social justice on issues still challenging us in our own times. Recommended for General Audiences."

Tickets normally run up to \$20 for this play, but Mr. Hauck graciously has agreed to perform a one-time-only show for AOF members as our general meeting program. It's free!

Paul Hauck has performed as Elwood P. Dowd in *Harvey* with the St. Michael's Actors Guild. In the intervening five years he has been seen with the T Street Players in such roles as Scrooge in *A*

Christmas Carol, Prof. Von Helsing in *Dracula*, Mr. Green in *Visiting Mr. Green*, John Ruffing in *Ravenscroft*, and most recently as Nick Flanagan in *The Guys*. Paul returned to St. Michael's to play Detective Trotter in *Mousetrap* and Samuel in *The Curious Savage*. He has also appeared as Porter Milgram in the Main Street Theater Works production of *Deathtrap*. This is Paul's first attempt at writing for the stage. In his spare time Paul works as a child clinical psychologist and maintains a vintage thirty-three year marriage.

Paul writes, "I can still remember being a young boy and being excited when I would read in the TV Guide that 'Inherit the Wind' would be on. I can still see Spencer Tracy taunting Fredric March with 'Brady, Brady, Brady!' as he paced the courtroom on our black and white set... As I have lived with the stories of this man's life I have been awed at the resonance of the issues of his era and ours. The continuous tension between labor and management as they compete for resources. The relationship of industrial wealth and government power. The constant effects of racism. The struggle to protect

individual rights when national security is threatened. The debate over what our children should be taught in school and how society should respond to the perpetrators of the most unspeakable crimes.

I hope this play will in some small measure serve to further Darrow's goals, in his words, 'to improve human understanding, to temper justice with mercy, to overcome hate with love.'"

Dr. Krubitzer uses the areas of the brain connected with the senses. Vision, smell, hearing, and taste all have specific identifiable portions of the brain dedicated to their work.

Using dyes and imaging equipment, one can “see” how these four sensory aspects of the brain develop under experimental treatments.

For example, Ms. Krubitzer studied blinded rodent brains to determine the answer to a question such as: “if a rodent is blind from before birth, will the ‘seeing’ portion of the brain be missing or smaller? She found through this experiment that the brain always produces the nerves and circuits for seeing, even when there is no sight. This indicates that the brain is genetically pre-programmed to produce the processing centers of the senses, regardless of their functionality.

Other of Ms. Krubitzer’s experiments relate to how a brain develops if a given brain has less tissue than normal for the species. For example, if a portion of a brain of a young rodent is removed, how will the brain tissue of the four senses deal with that loss? This experimental result showed that brains have a considerable capacity to make the best out of a very bad situation, by rearranging the size and locations of the normal functions of the brain to correspond to the lesser amount of brain tissue.

If one then compares the brains of animals with tissue loss with other species which *normally* have smaller brains, one finds great similarity of structure.

Ms. Krubitzer’s work is much larger than simply comparing various aspects of the brain. Her work is in conduction experiments to tease out the patterns of how brains have

evolved in response to various evolutionary challenges.

It should be noted that Dr. Krubitzer was accompanied to the talk by a number of members of her project staff. That is, she has a laboratory and a number of graduate and post graduate students working on understanding how the brain has developed from a simple structure of just a few neurons (e.g. snails) into the very complex human brain.

As a final word, note that Dr. Krubitzer is busy answering “how” questions. That is what scientists do. Science never touches “why” questions. Philosophers, supernaturalists, psychologists, parents, and lawyers are major players in the “why” area. Scientists focus on *how*.

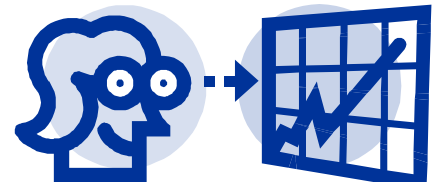

Intelligent Design at UC-D

communicate the uniquely factual basis for belief in the Bible as the wholly true Word of God and for personal faith in Jesus Christ."

The two high profile keynote speakers took turns demonstrating that an intelligent creator is responsible for all existence. Representing the academic community were two UCD science professors, Dr. Andreas Albrecht (Cosmology) and Dr. Dan Potter (Plant Sciences).

The evening began with a lengthy power point presentation by "internationally renowned astronomer and author," Dr. Hugh Ross, founder of Reasons to Believe. Referencing scriptures, Dr. Ross utilized scientific terminology to support his belief in "biblical cosmology." Dr. Ross suggested that Genesis 1:1 ("Let there be light.") describes an *ex nihilo*, "Big Bang" beginning and that Zechariah 12:1 ("The Lord...stretches out the heavens...") supports the expanding universe theory. The speaker demonstrated that hard-won scientific knowledge was divinely revealed in the bible many years ago. Dr. Ross believes that it is statistically improbable for life to exist without a

miracle. "The cosmos were (sic) designed for life," said Dr. Ross as he turned the podium over to his colleague, Dr. Rana. (During this short break, about one hundred audience members left the hall.)

Dr. Fazale Rana, who has a Ph.D. in chemistry, quoted Richard Dawkins' book, "The Blind Watchmaker." Dr. Rana claimed that Dawkins' definition of biology as "the study of complicated things that give the appearance of having been designed for a purpose" is evidence that even award-winning atheists concede to the "irreducible complexity" of life forms, thereby reinforcing intelligent design theory.

The two patient UCD scientists had an opportunity to participate in the dialogue near the end of the program. Cosmology Professor Andreas Albrecht, commented that he had "a very high regard for the role religion plays in society." As a member of the UCD science faculty, Dr. Albrecht pointed out that "the hallmark of science is to put a prediction in a position to falsify it." Dr. Albrecht respectfully stated that there was no science in any of the evening's program. He said frankly that "science is precise; biblical references are not. I don't see qualitative data or error bars."

Plant Sciences Professor Dan Potter had concerns that the "one true religion" claim of the Reason to Believe ministry may be dangerous to religious freedom of other beliefs. Dr. Potter mentioned, "The bible may be the one religious text that breeds intolerance."

As evidenced by UCD's serving as a venue for the proselytizing of creationism, the Intelligent Design Creationism campaign is alive and well in our nation's upper level educational institutions. (www.reasons.org)

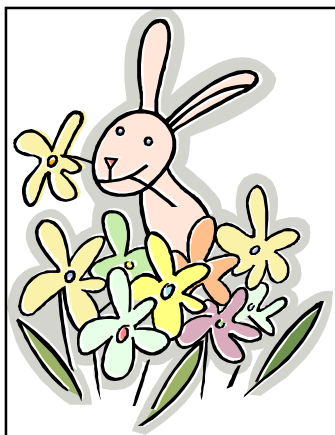
