International Human Rights Day Tuesday, December 10, 2024



"IHUD" is a way to promote, defend, and remember the basic human rights *every* person in *every* country has as a result of being born into this world. The basic document that outlines these rights is known as the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, as adopted by the United Nations in 1948.

The Universal Declaration of Human Rights came about as a result of the atrocities of World War II. As the United Nations came into being its charter gave human rights a new international legal status, and the need

to codify human rights as a means to prevent similar atrocities took shape. It created a Commission on Human Rights, which spent three years drafting the declaration with the help of such members as Eleanor Roosevelt, John P. Humphrey, Charles Malik and Rene Cassin. The declaration was adopted without dissent on December 10, 1948, and has grown in stature and respect over the years since its adoption as it continues to assert the human dignity and worth of every human being on the planet.

Since its adoption countries around the world have celebrated the anniversary, but it has only been since the 50th anniversary celebrations in 1998 that the holiday has gained in popularity.

Eleanor Roosevelt once said that the fate of human rights lies in the hands of everyone in every community. Freethinkers know the importance of this statement. It can often be a challenge for many of them to be given the same rights and opportunities as others in their own communities, much less in the world. They, of all people, understand the importance of keeping human rights the center of focus and attention in the world at large. Celebrating International Human Rights Day is a way to show how everyone, religious or not, is connected in ways that run deeper than the nature of belief.

Bill of Rights Day Sunday, December 15, 2024

Bill of Rights Day (by Presidential Proclamation):

Now, Therefore, I, Franklin D. Roosevelt, President of the United States of America, do hereby designate December 15, 1941, as Bill of Rights Day. And I call upon the officials of the Government, and upon the people of the United States, to observe the day by displaying the flag of

the United States on public buildings and by meeting together for such prayers and such ceremonies as may seem to them appropriate.

The first 10 amendments to the United States Constitution make up the Bill of Rights. Passed by Congress on September 25, 1789, these rights place limits on government power.

Did you know ...?

- The bill was introduced by James Madison. He later became the 4th President of the United States.
- The Bill of Rights initially had 12 proposed amendments. One concerned the number of constituents for each Representative. The other addressed compensation of Congressman. Neither were ratified.
- In 1992, compensation of Congressman was ratified 203 years later and is now the 27th amendment.
- The Bill of Rights is displayed in The Rotunda of the National Archives Building in Washington, DC.
- There were 14 copies of the Bill of Rights, one for each of the 13 states to sign and one for the federal archives. Only 12 copies survive today.

Solstice (December) Saturday, December 21


December Solstice is the *real* Reason for the Season. Called Winter Solstice in the northern hemisphere, Summer Solstice in the southern, people have marked this astronomical event for thousands of years. Many religions have seasonal holy days or celebrations linked to the December Solstice. It is the day the

Northern Hemisphere has less daylight than at any other time of the year (we call it *the shortest day*), and the Southern Hemisphere has more daylight occurs than any other time (*the longest day*).

The precise date of the December Solstice varies from year to year, but will occur between the 20th and 23rd of December.

"Solstice" derives from two Latin words: *sol* (meaning sun) and *sistere* (to cause to stand still). At noon in either hemisphere the sun will be low in the sky during the winter season, high in the sky during summer. The day with the least daylight is the Winter Solstice, where sun has the lowest elevation. So in the Northern Hemisphere, the December Solstice is officially the first day of winter, sometimes called Midwinter.







To the ancients, this day marked a key point in the cycle of life. For modern astronomy enthusiasts, it offers an opportunity to celebrate what we have learned about the cosmos, and allows us to revel in the excitement of space exploration and the complexity of the universe.

HumanLight Monday, December 23, 2024

HumanLight is a <u>Humanist holiday</u> celebrated annually on December 23. It was first celebrated in 2001, and was created to provide a specifically Humanist celebration during the <u>western world's holiday season</u>. The New Jersey Humanist Network founded the holiday in 2001 to aid <u>secular</u> people in commemorating the December holiday season without encroaching on other adjacent events—both religious ones such as <u>Christmas</u> and secular ones such as <u>Solstice.^[1]</u> The inaugural event involved only the



founding organization, but is now celebrated by many secular organizations and individuals across the United States and other countries. Various organizations have recognized the holiday, including the <u>American Humanist Association</u> in 2004. The HumanLight Committee maintains the official HumanLight webpage and engages with humanist organizations and the media about the holiday.

HumanLight is a secular holiday that focuses on the "positive, secular human values of reason, compassion, humanity and hope". While there are no universally accepted ways to commemorate the holiday, modern celebrations typically involve a communal meal among a family or group. The use of candles to symbolize reason, hope, compassion, and humanity has become widespread among those celebrating. Groups today also observe the holiday using charity work, gift exchanges, and other ideas associated with holidays and celebrations.


I thought Christmas was intentionally set to December 25th to coincide with the winter solstice which was celebrated all across Europe, Asia, and North Africa, though it was understood that Jesus was not born at this time. Some historians think he was born in the fall, and some think it may have been spring, but there is a consensus that it was not in December. One explanation is that some Christian bishop chose December 25th to prevent his people from participating in the Pagan Saturnalia festival which included feasting and giving gifts to the poor, but also included licentious partying.

However, there's a reluctance among many Christians to associate the Christmas celebration with Paganism. In fact historian William J. Tighe claims that Christ's birth is celebrated December 25th because it is nine months after Christ's conception which was supposedly March 25, and therefore has no relationship to the Pagan solstice celebrations. Supposedly, some believe that great prophets died on the date of their conception.

Ironically, the Vernal Equinox was also a time of Pagan Fertility festivals. So if Jesus' birthdate is free of Pagan connection, his conception was likely not.

Regardless of all of this, the first Christmas was not celebrated till 336 AD, while there is evidence of Ancient Winter Solstice celebrations dating back to about 3200 BC, so it is hard to see how the reason for any season can be something that occurred more than 3000 years after the first known seasonal celebrations.

So, what is the reason for the Pagan wintertime celebrations? Clearly the reason for the Pagan winter celebrations is grounded in something that actually occurs, the solstice. **HAPPY SOLSTICE**.

"Father," he prayed, "deliver this boy from his temptation, so he can get some peace. And may it be passed on to his abbot, so he learns a bit of understanding."


And apparently it worked. Soon afterwards, Father Apollo was walking along the road when he was passed by the abbot, scuttling into the nearest town.
